Description of Property and Eligibility Determination: *(Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo)*

The Hereford United Methodist Church building is a stone church with an irregular plan. The main block (nave) measures four bays by three bays and has a front-gable roof and square corner tower. The bracketed gable has a louvered ventilator and a patterned pressed metal infill and the corner tower has a gable portico with squared posts, narrow arched windows, a balustraded belfry and battlements. Windows in the church are arched with stained glass lights. The original church block was constructed in 1871 and additions between 1871 and 1909 have obscured its plan and fenestration. Additions to the church include an education wing and a wing attaching the church to the adjacent parsonage. The building exhibits an eclectic combination of late nineteenth century stylistic elements, including Romanesque windows and exposed masonry walls.

The existing Hereford United Methodist Church replaced earlier Methodist churches active in Hereford since before the turn of the nineteenth century. The church is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A and C. As a component of Hereford's oldest religious institution, the church played an important role in the community's social history. Despite additions that reflect the organic growth of the congregation, the church retains much of its architectural integrity and is an outstanding example of masonry religious architecture.

Hereford's original Methodist Congregation of 1797 moved from its location on Old York Road to the main turnpike route in 1871 and built a stone chapel with spire and belfry on a lot adjoining the parsonage which had been acquired in 1834. The building was altered and amplified in 1909. Present style is Romanesque Revival, featuring a battlemented entrance tower and belfry, also round-topped windows. The window lights are of opalescent glass. An educational building was added in 1959.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Hereford United Methodist Church has been built up in two successive expansion programs from a basic church of 1871 that was two bays wide and three bays deep. The original church has lost its identity. What exists now is an L-shaped church with a square battlemented entrance tower-belfry set in the east side of the York Road.

The nave of the church is a relatively low stone structure with four bays facing the street, three bays in depth along its south wall. There is a gable roof with a prominent pediment facing the street. The pediment is bracketed in the Italianate Victorian manner and has a round louvered ventilator. The tympanum space is filled in with pressed patterned tin. A very plain architrave runs between the stone wall and the pediment. Windows are of opalescent glass with only a few geometric decorations; window frames are round stone arches, the sills of wood.

The doors in the entrance tower face west (towards the road) and are punctuated with small glass panes, mainly decorative, that form a cross. Both doors are set under a round-topped transom with opalescent glass panes, surrounded by a round stone arch. These doors face the street, and are slightly set back from the street facade of the nave, reached by three poured concrete steps.

This square stone tower has a round-topped window in its north wall at street level, and at the second level of the tower, there are two slender, round-topped windows, one east, one north. At third level is the open belfry, with four round-topped arches. There is a wooden railing with square balusters across the lower part of each belfry opening. The top of the belfry is flat roofed, decorated with battlements.

The north leg of the L is a gable roofed segment with one bay facing the road. The gable end of this leg faces north, and is of course perpendicular to the nave. As finished in 1909, this leg of the church would have had two bays on its north gable end, but one of them has been covered up with the installation of a vestibule leading into the educational building. The window that survives is also round-topped. The pediment of this north wing is also supplied with a round louvered ventilator, its tympanum filled is with pressed patterned tin or aluminum.

The educational building that is tacked on to the east or rear of the 1871-1909 church segments is a one-story structure of contemporary design.

The style of this church is Romanesque Revival, and the drawing of 1893 shows that the Romanesque windows were an early feature when the church was started, and the theme was followed in the 1909 expansion; thus the church is pre-Richardsonian in its use of round arches and ordinary local stone.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Methodism in Hereford began at Foster's Meeting House, a log structure on the Old York Road (now called Hereford Road), where services were first held in or before 1797. The old location of the church was on a tract donated by John Foster to the trustees John Orrick, George Spindler, Nicholas Spindler, John Spindler, Samuel Tipton, and Richard Tipton. (1) The tract is still used as a cemetery, but in 1870, the congregation decided to move to the York Turnpike, which had not been laid out at the time of organizing the church. (2) The original building met the sad fate of the turnpike and used as Harry Coggin's tavern, and in 1893 it still stood but was Nathan Ensor's cobbling shop. Some time after 1900, it was ~~tear~~ down. (3)

The parsonage had been located on the York Turnpike since 1834, and the trustees used part of that lot for the new church in 1871. The new structure was a stone building three bays deep, two bays wide, with a spire and belfry. An excellent line drawing of the church appears in the 1893 album of churches on the Hereford Circuit. (4)

The cornerstone is marked 1909, which reflects a remodeling in Romanesque style that makes the church of 1871 almost unrecognizable. There was an educational building attached in 1959.

An adjoining lot was acquired in 1969 to extend the church property northward. (5) The additional ground had been Lot 7 in the breakup of Nicholas Foster's property in 1843, and had contained a house which passed to John Ensor at the auction. (6)


