Palmer Log House, Item 7

The capsule description of this small structure was written in 1980 during the survey of the Green Spring Valley and reads as follows:

Although this building is not the only log structure remaining in this area, it does characteristically stand out among its neighbors. The original exterior has not been covered with siding as most have, which therefore exposes many features, both structural and decorative.

Also important is the fact that the building, probably pre-Civil War, was built as a dwelling and has remained so to date. This helps describe an era when logs were used as a major method of construction, especially so in this Towson community.

At the time of the May, 1989, tour of log houses in the central county, Ruth B. Mascari noted in the tour leaflet, "This house has simple "V" notches and a gable end chimney. It was expanded with a full second story from its original one-story size. Dormers were later added." The dormers are of the somewhat rare "pop-up" type. The rooms added upstairs were reported to have been constructed with the reused timbers of a barn on the same property. (1)

The parlor paneling came from a row house on Cathedral Street in Baltimore City that was being demolished about 1933 to build the present main building of the Enoch Pratt Free Library.

In 1999 the owner of the house supplied the Landmarks Preservation Commission with the overall dimensions of the log house: 20 feet 3 inches by 30 feet. (2)



A plat of old land grants in the Green Spring Valley given to the LPC several years ago by Mrs. Nancy Trimble would suggest that the SE corner of Seminary Avenue and Falls Road lies on the survey called "Poor Jamaica Man's Plague." However, the log house may not date back to that distant period, as log construction continued at least into the 1860s for small houses. This corner was probably an outlying part of John Cockey of Thomas' holdings in the 1798 tax list. Cockey had four log structures in his tax account that year but they were most likely farther south where the Cockey Tavern was later built across from the present Montessori School. Neither can we match the present dimensions to any measured buildings in the 1798 tax list. The LPC staff investigated the Cockey Tavern several years ago before adding it to the Preliminary Landmarks List. In the 1823 tax list of Old District 2 John Cockey of Thomas owned 191 acres of Selsed (a land grant name) with \$250 worth of improvements, location not specified exactly. The Seminary Avenue corner was not separated from the Cockey premises until 1834. according to some sources, which prove to be true. Deeds in Towson trace this property back to a 10-acre lot acquired in February, 1845, by Edward Rider who purchased it from Robert Jones if we are reading the handwriting correctly. (1) Research in the Hall of Records shows that this land was called "part of Hellman's Addition" and was sold to Robert Jones via two deeds from John Cockey of Frederick County, one deed in 1834, another in 1838. (2). The recorded deeds in both Towson and in Annapolis call the land survey name "Hellman's Addition", which does not agree with the plat mentioned above. At any rate, this house does not seem to have been a possession of Richard Caton of Brooklandwood just across Falls Road.

The county map by J. C. Sidney and P. J. Browne published in Baltimore in 1850 showed a small house symbol at this corner labeled as property or home of R. Jones, which is puzzling if Jones sold to Edward Rider. The county atlas published in 1877 by G. M. Hopkins of Philadelphia showed a building at this site owned or occupied by J. W. Zink. As an atlas patron, Zink was listed in a table of Eighth District citizens; his profession was given as a gardener, a resident of the county since 1840, and the owner of 10 acres. Deeds in Towson prove that John W. Zink bought the ten-acre parcel from George H. and Eliza Hayes on March 7, 1867. (3) Hayes had acquired from Robert and Cassandra Jones on September 22, 1864. (4) At some point in its history, the house was moved 50 feet to the east and back from Falls Road. This action undoubtedly aided in its preservation. The Zink family owned it through the first third of the 20th century, when it was sold by Thomas H.

Zink and wife and W. Milton Zink and wife to Grace Ober Palmer, June 1, 1936. The property then measured 10.546 acres and embraced the corner where Seminary Avenue meets Falls Road. (5)

This was still a Palmer family house at the time of BCHT's log house tour in the spring of 1989, the owner on tax maps shown as J. Humbleton Palmer. (6)

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The log dwelling located on a lot at the southeast corner of Falls Road and Seminary Avenue is one of only a few remaining structures of a once larger working farm.

Early records include an 1850 map of Baltimore (Sidney) which locates "R. Jones" at this site. An 1857 Taylor map indicates "R. Jones, La Grange" and a tavern nearby. This is indicative of an estate at least as early as the 1850's, if not before. Robert Jones first acquired portions of a tract of land known as "Hellmores Addition" in 1838 from John Cockey, a prominent land owner and neighbor. George Heyse then owned this land in 1864 until he sold to John W. Zink in 1867. John W. Zink and his family held this corner lot for 69 years.

The 1877 Hopkins Atlas shows two buildings at the intersection; one adjacent to Falls Road, the other adjacent to Seminary Avenue. "J. W. Zink, residence" is located somewhat closer to the Seminary Avenue-Mays Chapel Road intersection.

The structure indicated along Falls Road is believed to be the existing log dwelling which now sits some distance from the road. The present owner, Dr. C. Harvey Palmer, states that the house had been moved from its original lot in the 1930's to its present location. This moving may correspond in date to the Palmer family first having acquired the land in 1938.

With respect to the owner's wishes, it was only possible to examine the log structure and surrounding outbuildings from a point no closer than Falls Road.

Only the west facade of the log structure facing Falls Road could be examined. This facade reveals a 1½ story structure, four bays long, with a steeply pitched gable-end roof. The fenestration is regular and contains 6/6 sash windows with wavy glass. The exposed logs are joined at the corners with V-notches, while unusual random stone chinking creates a most decorative effect.

The first level contains entrances in the outermost bays and a window in each of the inner bays. Just above the single story shed-roofed porch, where the roof joins the main block, protruding joist ends can be seen. This, along with gable-end dormers that break the eaves and a centrally located chimney combine to give the upper story as distinct a character as the lower one.

Approximately 40' East from Falls Road stand two stone outbuildings. On the northernmost side of an easterly driveway is a spring house. On the southernmost side stands a tall, practically windowless structure of undetermined use. The 1½ stories are topped

with a hipped roof which supports a cupola. Characteristics include flat wooden arches on the first story window and steps leading to a door on the east facade.






