DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

SKYFIELD was built about 1904, originally a symmetrical house of the Colonial revival, three bays in width, two storeys in height, having a deck-on-hip roof, wide shingled dormers and a wood balustrade around the roof deck; a one storey porch extended across the principal or north front; and a kitchen wing extended south behind the easterly portion of the main block with east wall and roofs aligned. Modest later additions toward the north and another toward the east have disguised the original simplicity and the design of this early twentieth century house; while those additions are not large they create an assymetrical composition, one which tends toward the picturesque.

The principal entrance was centered in the north front and the window above it had intersecting muntins suggesting Gothic tracery; this window is partially covered by the one and one-half storey north addition and the addition covers the entire doorway.

A wide central hall extends through the house with a large open staircase to the second floor at its south end; an intermediate landing is between the floors. A single large room is to the east; a large room and a very small room are to the west, the latter being at the south facade. The original north entrance opens into the north wing, its floor level below that of the house itself; the east wing is a large living room, also at a lower floor level, the interior steps adding greatly to the picturesque quality this house has acquired. Most detailing is original, boldly recalling the American Colonial.

The small frame barn set into the hillside south of the house is constructed of circular-sawn material, probably contemporary with the house. In its lower level the box stalls have horizontal wood plank lower walls with vertical iron bars above to a wood rail. An internal ramp (for the horses) connects the lower level with the upper, both opening to grade.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The early twentieth century Colonial revival style, of which SKYFIELD is an example, was an original interpretation of Colonial forms, a development which followed the Romanesque and Queen Anne styles of the late nineteenth century, tempered by the Centennial period of 1876. SKYFIELD is a large example in this style and its modest later additions have masked its origins, tending toward the asymmetrical picturesque.

SKYFIELD was built on approximately 16 acres carved out of the Stewart family estate, Cliffeholme.<sup>1</sup> It was constructed by Redmond Conyngham Stewart between 1902-1904, following his 1902 marriage to Katharine Latimer Small of York, Pennsylvania. The house was originally a boxlike building with a porch across the front. In the mid-1920's, the Stewarts had the porch removed and a large living room was added.<sup>2</sup>

Like his older brother Charles, Redmond graduated from Johns Hopkins University, and then he earned a law degree from the University of Maryland in 1894. Three years later he was one of the charter members of Baltimore's Politico-Literary Club. In attendance at the founding was Woodrow Wilson, who was also present at the Club's fifth and tenth birthdays.<sup>3</sup>

A prominent Baltimore attorney, Stewart was also a member of the Maryland House of Delegates in 1900. During his brief political career, he was one of the framers of the State Aid Road Law and served as a Lieutenant in the Maryland National Guard at the time of the Spanish-American War. During the First World War he served in France with the First Division as the Judge Advocate General. He was decorated with the United States Distinguished Service Medal and the French Croix de Guerre.<sup>5</sup>

This Stewart and several of his neighbors maintained an informal hunting field in the Valley in the 1880's. The group expanded and in 1892 formally organized the Green Spring Valley Hunt Club. At the club's first meeting, Stewart, then 19, was elected Master of the Fox Hounds, a post he held for 25 years. Second only to foxhunting was Redmond's love of racing. He rode in 16 of the annual Maryland Hunt Cup races, although only once coming home a winner.<sup>6</sup>

Redmond C. Stewart died in 1936. His wife, Katharine continued to live at Skyfield until 1952 when she remodelled the gardener's house on the property. Ownership of Skyfield then passed to her son Latimer Small Stewart and his wife, Eleanor Clark Wesley, the present owners.<sup>7</sup>
