DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Jacobs House is a very simple early twentieth century farm house converted with elegant detailing in the 1920's to recall a sophisticated New England dwelling of the very early nineteenth century.

Examination of a small photograph reveals that the original house was 'T' shaped, two storeys in height with one-storey porches surrounding it; the rear wing was one bay in length. Long windows in the first storey, probably 2/4 or perhaps 4/4 extended to the porch floor and 2/2 were in the second. The alterations, designed by Wilson L. Smith of Smith & May, Baltimore architects, designed the additions which extended the bar of the 'T' to the front, and lengthened the stem or rear wing.

The Principal entrance has a correctly detailed pedimented surround; the 12/12 windows have paneled shutters in the first storey. louvred blinds in the second. The beaded weatherboarding is terminated at corners with wide corner boards trimmed to suggest pilasters. Semi-circular fanlights are in each gable.

Correct period detailing of each principal room within recalls the earlier New England style.

The house was published shortly after its restyling in TOWN and COUNTRY, November 15, 1928.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Originally a very simple farmhouse, the JAconbs House was converted with elegant detailing in the 1920's to recall a sophisticated New England dwelling of the very early nineteenth century.

The Jacobs House was owned by Mr. and Mrs. Walter H. Buck from June, 1907 until Mrs. Buck's death in 1977. Major improvements were made in 1914, or 1915 and again in 1924. The first deed located is from October 1, 1895, covers about 15 acres. The total acreage owned by Mrs. Buck at her death was about 75 acres. There are three houses on the property; one being that owned by the Jacobs. The other two houses are owned by Mrs. Buck's son, Dr. Walter Buck.


