**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

The Wingle house, located on 118 Church Lane, is a 2 1/2 stories rectangular framehouse with white asbestos shingles resting on a stone foundation. It has a gable roof with very deep cornices on the south facade suggestive of a pediment.

The front or south facade is two bays wide on the first floor with a central four panel wooden door. The window, which is located towards the west side, is 2/2 double hung with green louver shutters. The first floor also contains a three bays wide porch supported by wooden columns which stretch from the south facade all the way towards the east facade.

The second floor of this south facade is one bay wide with a 2/2 double hung window with green louver shutters. On the top floor there is a smaller 2/2 attic window.

On the east facade one can see a mixture of roofings. Towards the southwest there is a 2/2 double hung window with louver shutters and a four panel wood door against the end. Then there is a 2/2 double hung window and two 6/6 double hung windows in the addition on the back. The second floor contains a 2/2 gable dormer.

The west facade is one bay wide on its first floor with a 2/2 double hung window facing the northwest. On the second floor there is a small narrow glass window on its southwestern side and a 2/2 double hung window towards the northwest.

The north side is inaccessible.
