DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Remembrance Farm is situated at the rear of a $\frac{1}{4}$ mile long tree-lined driveway off of the west side of Long Green Pike. The house is located near the center of its 10 acre tract and faces east.

Remembrance Farm is a $2\frac{1}{2}$ story, frame, Classical Revival building on a stone foundation, with a dormered, hipped roof and flanking porches. There is a main block to the east and a smaller rear wing at the west with a narrower connecting section. The entire house has been covered with vinyl siding and all the original windows and shutters have been replaced. A dentiled cornice runs under the eaves of the roof around the entire house and the portico.

The front (east) facade is a symmetrical composition, 5 bays wide, defined by 4 engaged pilasters with Ionic capitals, 2 at the corners of the main block and 2 at the corners of the projecting central bay. Porches flank the north and south sides of the main block. A 2-story pedimented portico with modillioned cornice projects from the central bay supported by four wooden, Ionic columns. A lunette is placed in the center of the pediment.

The first floor of the central bay contains a 3'6" wide main entrance door flanked by sidelights with tracery beginning at doorknob height. The sidelights are framed by fluted pilasters with Ionic capitals. A balustraded railing wraps around the first floor of this facade. Also at first floor level are 4 double hung, shuttered windows (1 over 1), 2 on either side of the projecting bay.

On the second story, above the main entrance door, is a small balustraded gallery, one bay wide, entered by a 10 lighted double door with sidelights. A small fanlight tops the door. There are 4, shuttered, windows on the second story situated directly above those on the first floor level.

Above the second story are 2, pedimented, dormers, one on each side of the portico. Two common bond chimneys, each with a corbelled cap, are situated at the hip ends of the roof. There is a balustraded deck on the hip roof.

The $2\frac{1}{2}$ story north facade is asymmetrical consisting of a 3-bay wide main block and a squarish, 1-bay wide rear wing, connected by an indented 1-bay wide section. A porch, supported by 4 wooden, Doric columns covers the first floor of the main block which has engaged pilasters at the corners. The pilaster at the northwest corner is missing its capital. The balustraded deck is visible above the two pedimented dormers on the main block, and the dentiled cornice continues around the entire facade.

The first floor of the main block of the north facade is covered by the 3-bay porch. Two sets of French doors open onto the porch, each door containing 16 lights. A 7-light, rectangular transom tops each doorway. A cornerstone at the northwest corner of the main block reads, "Wm. Armour Jenkins, 1905." The second story of the main block contains 3 double hung, shuttered windows evenly spaced. Two pedimented dormers are present above the second story, and the chimney and balustraded deck top the roof. Paired windows are aligned on the first and second stories of the indented section. The westernmost block has 2 windows on the first floor and 1 on the second. The rear (west) facade is asymmetrical and contains the rear wing with the main block behind it. An enclosed, hipped roof porch stretches across the first floor of the wing. Two pedimented dormers pierce the roof, one on the northern area of the main block and one on the rear wing.

The first floor of the rear wing contains the enclosed porch with 4 half columns supporting its hipped roof. Two shuttered windows are on the second floor, and one pedimented dormer and an internal chimney of the same type as those on the main

block are on the hipped roof. Three shuttered windows, 2 on the first floor and 1 on the second, are on the western wall of the main block. A pedimented dormer pierces the roof of same. Trellising screens the flanking porch on the north end of the main block from view.

The south facade of $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories is another asymmetrical composition with a modern enclosed porch covering the first floor of the main block. Windows are fairly evenly spaced though they vary in size. There are 3 pedimented dormers on this elevation, 2 paired on the main block and 1 on the rear wing. There is no indentation between main block and wing on this elevation.

The first floor of the southern facade contains 3 shuttered windows on the rear wing and an enclosed porch off of the main block containing central sliding doors and 2 large, flanking expanses of glass. Six shuttered windows are on the second story, evenly spaced, 3 on each block. Three pedimented dormers pierce the roof, 2 on the main block and 1 on the rear wing. Two chimneys and the balustraded deck are visible at the crest of the roof.

The interiors of Remembrance Farm have been somewhat altered. Original hardwood floors, wood and marble fireplace surrounds, mouldings, panelling, and hardware, however, are still in place. Remembrance Farm has a central hall plan with flanking parlors. The connector section of the house contains a narrow hall with flanking rooms and the rear wing is 1 room.

The expansive hallway on the first floor has an open well, 3 run stairway on the south wall and a diagonally placed, Tudor arched, marble fireplace on the north wall. A leaded glass skylight illuminates the stairwell. On the east wall north of the entrance is a rectangular recess with an arched niche inset above it. Panelling in the hallway is painted white.

North of the hall is a double parlor separated by an arch. In the easternmost room is an arched, corner fireplace of marble (back to back with the one in the hall) with a cartouche and flanking spandrels. The westernmost room has 2 bookcases, arched, keystone, and with enclosed lower cabinets. They are on the south wall. The bookcases flank a doorway. Each parlor has a double door opening onto the northern porch.

The south parlor (now a music room) has a wooden mantelpiece with reeded pilasters on either side of the opening which has an interior slate surround.

The dining room to the west of the music room has a bay window on the south wall and an elaborate arched mantelpiece on the north wall, carved with leaves and bunches of fruit. The mantel shelf is supported by consoles.

In the west wing, the original 3-room plan which consisted of pantry, mudroom, and kitchen, now contains one large kitchen. A rear stair is situated at the southeast corner of the room.

Upstairs, the plan is the same as downstairs. A bath separates the 2 northern bedrooms. The master bedroom with spacious bath consumes the entire rear wing, formerly containing 3 rooms.

At the third floor, the stairwell has been enclosed by glass presumably to save on fuel costs. Two small rooms are at the north end. A small narrow attic space is in the pediment of the portico. A bath is on the south side of the hall and a billiard room is at the rear (west).

To the south of the main house is an earlier, small, stone building of uncoursed rubble. It is 2 stories high with a basement, is 2 bays wide and one deep, and has a gable roof and a single entrance on the east elevation. All windows are casement. The front (east) facade has a batten door on the southernmost bay and a window to the north of it which contains horizontally run, diamond shaped bars set in iron. The second floor has one casement window, unbarred. The north facade is a blind wall. The west facade has one window on the second floor and one on the first which again contains iron bars, these being round, vertically placed, and set into the wooden window frame. On the second floor of the south elevation one finds a large batten door with large strap hinges. Inside, there is one room on the first floor and one above it. A bath is at the northwest corner of the first floor. The stair begins at the northeast corner.

Other outbuildings include a modern aluminum sided, 2 car garage, a frame shed, and a combination poultry house and small stable, all fairly modern. A large brick horse barn with diamond shaped ventilator patterns is on an adjoining property and was in all likelihood a part of this complex at one time.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The significance of Remembrance Farm lies both in its architecture and its importance to the history of Long Green Valley. Remembrance Farm is an excellent example of high style, Classical Revival architecture in a rural setting, containing many of the elements which make up this style of building such as rigid symmetry in both plan and elevation and the use of such architectonic feature as a pedimented portico and second floor gallery. Remembrance Farm also achieves significance from its association with the Jenkins family, who were among the original settlers of Long Green Valley in the early 1700's.

History and Support:

Remembrance Farm was built in 1905 by William Armour Jenkins descendant of Michael Jenkins who received the land by grant from Frederick, Lord Baron of Baltimore on April 7, 1723. The Jenkins had retired to "Long Green Land" from the St. Mary's area in persuit of religious freedom after the Catholic Disability Act was passed. The patent calls the land Jenkins Purchase which consisted of 288 acres for which Michael Jenkins paid 310 2s plus the cost of surveying at 7 4s.

The current Remembrance Farm is not built upon the foundation of the original Jenkins homestead, known as Sleepy Hollow, as has been suggested. The stone in the foundation of Wm. Armour Jenkins home was reused stone from the slave quarter of the original homestead. The slave quarter was torn down just prior to the construction of Remembrance Farm. The stone outbuilding near the current residence which has recently been known as the slave quarters is probably the storehouse which along with the smokehouse and springhouse were left intact at the construction of the 1905 building. These latter two buildings have since disappeared. A quarry on the property which is now a lake supplied the stone for all the buildings of the original complex. The Jenkins also donated stone from their quarry as well as land for the St. John's Church on Long Green Pike just north of Remembrance Farm.

The storehouse, though altered, is the only original building remaining from the old Jenkins homestead complex which was extensive. A blacksmith shop, slave quarter, smokehouse, and springhouse were also on the property as well as the main house which was constructed of brick and weatherboard with a shingle roof. The 18th century house was torn down at the completion of the 1905 residence.

Two anecdotes about the Jenkins family are of particular interest. It is said that the Jenkins named Long Green Valley after their ancestral castle at Aglesea, Wales which was called Llyn Green Castle. Secondly, Wm Armour Jenkins grandfather Josias Jenkins, being a major in the War of 1812, was in command of a company of men in the defense of Baltimore at the battle of North Point when some of them were captured by the enemy. Francis Scott Key was sent aboard a British vessel to effect an exchange of prisoners to free these men. Although unsuccessful in this venture,

Francis Scott Key gained immortality on this expedition by writing the Star Spangled Banner.

Jenkins Purchase has been broken into many parcels since 1723. This is probably the only parcel bearing any remains of the original Jenkins homestead.



upon him as Personal Representative aforesaid, do grant and convey unto the said parties of the third part, as tenants by the entireties, their assigns, the survivor of them and the survivor's heirs, personal representatives and assigns, in fee simple, all that property situate in Baltimore County, State of Maryland, and described as follows, that is to say:

BEGINNING for the same at a point South 81 degrees 31 minutes 00 seconds East 702.04 feet from a stone found at the beginning point of the first parcel of land described in a deed recorded among the Land Records of Baltimore County in Liber 2063, folio 472, said stone being also at the end of the first line of a tract called Jenkins Purchase, also the beginning of the first parcel of land in a deed dated May 13, 1924, and recorded among the Land Records of Baltimore County in Liber WPC No. 593, folio 291, conveyed by William A. Jenkins to James Arthur; thence running reversely and binding on part of the 24th line of the first parcel described in Liber 2063, folio 472, South 81 degrees 31 minutes 00 seconds East 462.96 feet to the end of the twenty-third line of the before mentioned parcel; thence running reversely and binding on part of the twenty-third line of the before mentioned parcel South 61 degrees 49 minutes 00 seconds East 287.62 feet; thence for the five courses as now surveyed: South 21 degrees 49 minutes 08 seconds West 348.01 feet to a fence post; thence North 58 degrees 28 minutes 23 seconds West 16.43 feet; thence South 21 degrees 49 minutes 08 seconds West 261.55 feet to a fence; thence running along and passing through a corner of said fence North 68 degrees 20 minutes 23 seconds West 710.59 feet; thence North 20 degrees 47 minutes 40 seconds East 533.94 feet to the place of beginning. Containing 10.00 acres of land more or less.

TOGETHER WITH a right of way 12 feet wide over the land of Harry A. Kalish, et al., for purposes of ingress, egress and regress as well as the installation and maintenance of utility services such as gas, electricity and/or water at the sole cost and expense of William A. Rodgers and James D. Tuttle, their heirs and assigns, (see Deed dated April 1, 1974, and recorded among the Land Records of Baltimore County in Liber EHK Jr. No. 5436, folio 062), for the cost of installation as well as for the replacement of the surface in the same condition prior to the installation, leading from the property above described in a generally southeasterly direction to the Long Green Pike, more particularly described as follows:






