The ground here was merely cut-over timber land in 1881, and it only sold for \$300 in 1887, but a dwelling worth \$800 was charged to Wesley R. Cuddy in 1896. Alvin J. Trout acquired the building in 1921. Although tax ledgers list a dwelling, eyewitnesses in Parkton recall it as a store, operated successively by Jim and Alvin Trout. The building is Italianate Victorian in style, frame, flat roofed, with a full width front porch. The old applied decoration at the cornice has been replaced with cornice, soffits, and eaves of white aluminum. The old one-room store area is a separate one-story north wing. The entire building has been covered with green aluminum siding which has smothered any original woodwork. This spacious building is now used as apartments.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Trout Store has been converted to apartment space and much improved with contemporary material, but still bears the look of commercial architecture. There is enough of the residential left to describe the style as Italianate Victorian. This is a frame two-story, flat-roofed structure four bays wide by two bays deep in the main block, with one-story additions at each end. Windows in the main block are modern replacements with metal frames, sash types with 1-over-1 panes.

A full-width front porch runs across the main block, its deck six steps above grade. The porch roof is supported by two posts set on the porch deck and by a slanted post at the south end of the porch. A centrally located door and two windows open onto the porch, the windows aligned with the outer bays of the second story. The eaves of the flat roof overhang the house walls and in recent rebuilding, older Italianate decorations have been replaced by cornices, soffits, and eaves of standardized white aluminum. The old one-room storeroom at the north end of the structure is flat-roofed, set on a stone foundation and the one bay is filled with large twin windows of plate glass.

A one-story, one-bay foundation on the south end of the building is perched on concrete block piers. It has one sash window of 1-over-1 format facing the street. On the south facade are two bays; the one nearest the street containing a contemporary metal and glass door; the eastward bay (away from the road) contains a twin double-hung sash window of 1-over-1 layout. The roofing over this section is hipped. There is also a gable-roofed rear wing of functional design.

The entire structure is covered with green aluminum siding. Any original Victorian features have been smothered by this sheathing and its associated soffiting and embossed cornice sections.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Like most of Parkton, the ground here was part of the vast 3,000-acre Turner estate, acquired in 1875 by Christolf Kolter from James C. Turner, Jr. (1) Kolter acquired 220 acres on which he conducted a lumber business, manufacturing telegraph poles and cross-ties. By 1881, Kolter and his partner were insolvent and the ground here was advertised for sale at public auction as cleared land. (2) Sarah C. Young acquired a very large parcel in 1884, and soon conveyed to George P. Everhart. (3) In 1887, George P. Everhart and wife conveyed one acre of this once large parcel to Wesley T. R. Cuddy, Senior; the cost was \$300, which would not allow for a very substantial structure. (4)

The 1896 tax ledger showed Wesley R. Cuddy with 1½ acres at Parkton, one cow, an outbuilding worth \$50, and a dwelling worth \$800, which is presumably the surviving structure. (5)

The following year, Cuddy sold to Rebecca A. Stabler for \$5 plus assumption of a mortgage. (6) In 1909, Ms. Stabler was in debt and conveyed her property to a trustee, Harry E. Karr; the creditors sued Karr, and on April 10, 1910, the property was offered at public auction, following an advertisement in the Democrat and Journal. (7) The trustees, Carville D. Benson, et al. conveyed to James G. Trout. (8) The 1911 tax ledger showed Trout with a dwelling worth \$850 and the same \$50 in outbuildings. (9)

The place had been advertised as "improved by a good frame dwelling house, stable, and outbuildings" when Mrs. Stabler was sued for default. The house was burdened by both first and second mortgages. (10) The house is shown as a small square in the 1915 Bromley Atlas.

In 1914, Louis V. Tipton acquired the mortgaged property at public auction for \$1,627, and he appears as owner in later amendments to the 1911 tax ledger. (11) The 1918 tax ledger described the property as adjoining Lydia E. Wilson on the north; improvements were:

Deeds and tax ledgers show these same assets conveyed to Alvin J. Trout in 1921. (13) Alvin J. Trout acquired an adjoining parcel in 1939 from James G. Trout. (14)

Alvin J. Trout's widow conveyed to Carroll Reynolds Trout and Zelda Maria Derrenberger in 1955. (15) The foregoing tenants and their spouses sold promptly to James L. Street in a deed immediately following. (16)

Although the tax ledgers seem to call this place a house, it was actually the Trout store, first operated by Jim Trout and later by Alvin Trout, as remembered by Miss Emily Stiffler, who lives four houses to the north. (17)




