The house retains little of its original integrity and appears to be not eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.



One of the original frame houses of the 19th Century village survives as a sales room for used cars and trucks; a very plain vernacular style structure of two storeys in frame and clapboard has been amplified with a one-story office addition with a mixture of display windows. The house was set close to the road to maximize its original three acres for agricultural use. A house probably existed shortly after Thomas Hale began to pay ground rent in 1843. The Hale house is shown in the 1850 map by J.C. Sidney. The house passed through various assignments and was owned among others by W. Foster, listed as a carpenter in the 1878 state business directory. Rachel Fell, shown as owner in the 1876 tax ledger, owned \$1000 worth of stock in trade, suggesting that the house also served as a store. S. Howard Miller, a blacksmith, bought the place in 1924 and operated a gas station on the lot to the south. In 1951, this house lot became detached from the larger parcel, where there was an Esso gas station.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Hale House is a very plain vernacular structure of frame and clapboard, three bays wide, two bays deep, two stories high, with a one-story office and shop addition tacked onto the north end. Only the second-story windows provide any clues as to the original appearance of this building before it was ruined for the purposes of marketing used trucks. The three windows of the main facade, as well as those on the gable ends, are 2-over-2 double-hung sash windows of generous proportions. The first story bays are lost in the added office space which incorporates a plate-glass window, an office door, and a 15-light display or shop window, and a wide expanse of unfenestrated clapboarding.

The main block has a gable roof covered with bluish rubber or asphalt material in good condition. One inside end-chimney with a corbelled cap rises at the north end. The plain roof eaves overhang at the gable ends. There are no attic windows.

This house has a frame rear wing flush with the north end of the main block. The side yard is not accessible. Even on weekends, it is not possible to photograph the main facade for the accumulation of used trucks, tractors, and other vehicles that stand between the house and the edge of the public highway.

Foundation is stone.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This old frame house was set close to the turnpike road to preserve its three acres of space for agricultural purposes. A ground rent was established here in 1843 when Henry M. Merryman, a large local landowner, leased this lot to Thomas Hale. Hale is shown on the 1850 map by J. C. Sidney. (1) A later deed provides the recitation of assignments of the house: William Rowe, 1850; Erastus Cole, 1862; James H. Boyd, 1865; Margaret M. Stewart, 1867; Frances M. Mather, 1868; William Foster, in 1869, and Edwin Heffner, Jr. in 1870. (2) The only person in this series of residents who can be found in the 1878 business directory is W. Foster, listed as a carpenter. (3)

This seems to be the C. Fell house shown in the 1877 atlas, although the main street of Hereford is crowded with names. In 1882, Henry N. Merryman sold his interest in the ground rent to Mary A. Fell, owner of the dwelling; this deed mentioned the adjoining tracts as the Academy Lot and J. O. Jessop's. (4)

The property came into the hands of Rachel Fell who had been found in the 1876 tax ledger with \$1000 worth of "Stock in Trade" and a carriage. The 1878 State Business Directory had listed her under General Merchandise. Angeline Marsh bought the Fell property in 1890 and mortgaged the place; she died in 1901 and testimony in a subsequent suit revealed that one of her sons, John George Marsh had not been heard from in 15 years—he had enlisted in the army and came home for one week and then went off without notice. Andrew Marsh, age thirty, testified, "I work around by the day." Of the house, Andrew said, "It is very much out of repair and needs considerable money spent on it." The 1896 tax ledger called it a frame house (\$650) and there were then a stable and outbuildings worth but \$60. (5) At the public sale, Tego T. Bull bought the three acres, three rods and in 1906 sold to John T. Divens. The 1918 tax ledger gave dimensions of the house as 14 x 20 and 16 x 22 (two stories); there were also two outbuildings. (6)

John T. Diven, widower, sold to S. Howard Miller and wife in 1924. Miller was the local blacksmith in the 1915 business directory, and in 1926 he made the transition to the motor age and opened a gas station south of the former Diven house. (7) In 1930, Emory C. Leight became owner, followed in 1936 by Fred E. Wilhelm, in 1944 by Thomas E. Neuberger, in 1946 by Michael J. Wheeler, then Forrest John Sheffield, then James S. Norris, and in 1951 by Stewart C. Nicholson; in 1951, the gas station became detached from the residential property by leasing it to the Standard Oil Company (then using the name ESSO). (8) The property came into the hands of the present owners, William E. and Ada M. Maseth in 1959. The house is the office of a used car business, Bob's Auto, and the view of the house is almost always obscured by parked vehicles and trucks.


