The Canoles House is a 2½-story wood frame Victorian house. The house has an irregular plan and is side-gabled with a centered cross gable and gabled rear ell addition. There is a full width shed roof bracketed porch with an eyebrow dormer and finial. There is a second story bay window in the south elevation and the windows are metal double-hung sash (1/1 lights). The roof is clad by composition shingles and the building is clad by wood drop siding. Ornamentation includes pendants and undulating shingles in the front cross gable and shaped wood shingles in the rear gable.

This house was built between ca. 1867 and 1876, according to the MIHP form completed for this property in 1980. Despite the replacement of the original windows, this building retains much of its integrity and is an excellent example of high style Victorian architecture. This building appears to be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C.



CANOLES HOUSE/ HELD HOUSE

The use of ground-rents in Hereford makes it difficult to date this house, but a structure may have stood in 1867 when the lease was assigned. In 1882, Charles C. Canoles took over the lease for \$325 and redeemed the ground-rent in 1883. Mary Eliza Canoles inhabited the house and in 1894 conveyed to Scott F. Matthews. The house was described as frame and log in the 1896 tax ledger when owned by Mollie E. Matthews. This appears as a clapboarded house, cross-gabled, in the Downing-Vaux tradition of the Victroian, somewhat like houses found in Lutherville. The main facade faces the side yard. The west side elevation is somewhat ornate, with a second-story bay that projects from the gable end of the main block with curved lintels, scroll brackets, dentiling, and fish-scale shingles.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Canoles House or Held House is a frame and clapboard structure in the Downing-Vaux tradition of the Victorian, somewhat like houses found in Lutherville, unlike others found in Hereford. It is an L-shaped house, apparently a duplex, judging from the two side doors facing York Road. However, its best architectural features face the north yard, where there is a broad, full-width entrance porch and centrally located door. The wide, but not full-width, porch that faces the York Road, which is only a few feet away, is seen to be a side porch upon some analysis.

Proceeding on the premise that the main or north facade is the one opening into the north or side yard, it is seen that the house is cross-gabled, two stories plus attic, three bays wide. The full-width, shed-roofed porch leads to a center door. The porch roof is supported by four square posts and two recessed posts. The posts are decorated with delicate scroll brackets. The porch is railed with plain, square balusters. The five windows of this facade are double-hung sash types of 2-over-2 format. The cross-gable has a portion of jerkinhead roofing and its pediment is decorated with fish-scale shingles and with a row of dowels or spokes. The upper windows have prominent carved wooden lintels, and there is a white wooded architrave running across the main facade, except under the cross-gable.

Windows are fitted with louvered shutters.

The west facade is the somewhat elaborate elevation facing York Road. It consists of the gable end of the main block, plus a wing that is logically a rear extension. A one-story porch three bays wide embraces two doors and one window. This side is a total of five bays in all. The porch is two steps above grade, supported by four square posts and two recessed posts, their scroll brackets similar to those on the front of the house. The north door is paneled, the south door provided with multiple glass panes. The south door has a wooden storm door of multiple panes. The porch is flanked on either side by a double-hung sash window of 2-over-2 format, fitted with shutters, the same design as the one window facing the porch between doors. The porch railing is similar to that on the main (north) porch.

At second-story level, there are three bays, two in

the "rear wing," one in the gable end of the main block. The windows in the wing are typical of the house, 2-over-2 types with shutters. The bay in the gable end of the main block takes the form of a projecting pavilion and extends about a foot or so beyond the surface of the house itself. This pavilion contains twin, double-hung sash windows of 1-over-1 format, each window protected by a single, full-sized louvered shutter. An elaborate carved wooden lintel with dentiling tops these twin windows and leads to a rectangular attic window, rectangular in layout, with two rows of five lights each. The projecting bay rises to meet the gable end of the main block and it has a miniature hip roof of its own—set within the eaves of the larger gable. The small pavilion roof is decorated with a dented cornice.

What space remains in the gable end is filled in with fish-scale shingles, and an elaborate segment of cornice.


An elaborate architrave and cornice run along the eaves of the so-called rear wing.

The south end of the rear wing has no windows, except for a rectangular attic window in the gable. The gable end here is filled in with fish-scale shingles.

The portion of the main block that is not obscured by the rear wing has a one-story shed-roofed open porch. Two windows of 2-over-2 format open onto the back porch roof.

This house has a black rubber roof. There are two brick chimneys with corbelled caps, irregularly spaced. The clapboard is painted a light grey, the shutters a light blue. The foundation is disguised by the clapboards which reach almost to the ground.

This house is closely surrounded by vegetation which makes photography difficult. The north facade, the most characteristic, is always shaded by leaves when summer solstice sun would be available to record it.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Canoles House stands on one of the Merryman family lots that were surveyed in 1843 in the southeast corner of the developing town of Hereford. These lots were leasehold properties and the dual descent of both ground and structures is somewhat difficult to follow, because there is an improper "Same As" clause in 1874. (1)

It is difficult to prove that this structure was found on the 1850 map or on the 1852 Assessment when the ground was leased to William Griffiths.

In 1867, John Griffith assigned a lease for two large lots to William Coney for \$700. This study has already attempted to match up the \$700 worth of structures conveyed in that assignment of lease with the Griffith House (MHT No. BA 2060). (2) But two houses might have existed then.

Coney assigned the two lots - 12 acres - to Henry Ruhl in 1874 for \$540 and Ruhl assigned to Charles C. Canoles for \$325 in 1882. (3) Ruhl had 17 acres and Improvements worth \$450 in the 1876 tax ledger. (4) The H. Ruhl house appears north of the Shane house in the 1877 atlas—the Shane house being the former Griffith House, which stands on a small lot. (5)

It could be argued that two structures existed in 1867, both the Canoles House and the Shane House; Mrs. Shane paid \$360 to take over the leasehold and improvements on the lot to the south in 1868; that would have left a reasonable amount of improvements on the lot to the north; certainly no one would pay much for the privilege of assuming the ground rent on a vacant lot.

Mary Eliza Canoles became Mary Eliza Matthews, and in 1894 she conveyed in fee to Scott P. Matthews, having extinguished the Merryman family's ground rent interest in 1883. (6)

Described as frame and log, the house was charged to Mollie E. Matthews in the 1896 tax ledger, valued at \$700. (7) Scott P. Matthews sold in 1905 to Arthur Arnold. Arnold sold in 1907 to John H. Peeling. (8) Peeling sold to Jacob Bull in 1909. (9) Bull was shown in the 1918 tax ledger with

Jacob Bull died in 1935 and in 1960, title passed to Elmer H. Bull and in 1975 to Stephen M. and Jestina McD. Held. (11)

This is the only Victorian house in Hereford that has any Downing-Vaux touches.

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
