

This building is a 2½-story wood frame vernacular house constructed on a masonry wall foundation. The house measures three bays by three bays and there is a full-width bracketed shed roof porch and an awning stoop on the south side of the house. The side-gabled roof is clad by composition shingles and the house is clad by vinyl siding. There are two brick interior chimneys and the windows are wood double-hung sash (4/1 and 6/1 lights). There is a rear gable-roof ell addition.

~~The house was built between 1853 and 1867, according to the MIHP form completed for this property in 1980. Because of additions and alterations, this building retains little of its architectural integrity, however, the MHT believes that the property is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places because it continues to exemplify the linear layout of Hereford.~~

Despite alterations, the building retains sufficient integrity to exemplify late 19th century vernacular domestic architecture in the region. A representative example.

The Griffith House is found on neither the 1850 map nor the 1852 assessment, but definitely existed in 1867 when John Griffith assigned a leased lot and its structure for \$700 to William Coney. Coney sold to Adeline Shane in 1868 for only \$360, and she appears with a house and lot in the 1876 tax ledger. This is a two-story frame house in Victorian or vernacular style with gable roof and full-width front porch, its supporting posts decorated with prominent scroll brackets and small pendants. There is a prominent architrave and cornice between posts and the porch roof. One of the bays opening on the porch contains a prefabricated, relatively recent, bay window. The main roof is gabled, covered with blue-green rubber shingling. Wall covering is white composition shingle.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Griffith House is a two story plus attic Victorian or Vernacular style house mainly noticable for its porch decorations. The house is composed of a gable roofed section with its roof line parallel to the road and a rear wing with a very low second story.

The main block has three bays opening on the porch, two bays at second-story level. The front door is in the middle bay; it is a solid contemporary door without window lights, protected by a glass and metal storm door. There is a rectangular transom over this door. This house probably has a center-hall plan.

In the bay to the north (or left) of the door is a contemporary, prefabricated bay window with three surfaces. The bay south of the door contains an older double-hung sash window, 4-over-4 in layout.

The porch is full-width, shed-roofed, supported by four round posts and two recessed posts. The posts are decorated with prominent scroll brackets with small pendants between. There is a prominent architrave above the posts and also a cornice. The porch deck is wood, about one step above grade. The railing is wood, composed of a minimum of square balusters widely spaced.

There are two windows at the second story level, set in the extreme bays—the north window, a contemporary 1-over-1 replacement, the south window a 6-over-1 mixture of sashes.

In the south end of the main block, there are original windows in the rear bay which serve to light the back rooms, a 3-over-1 window at the first story, a 4-over-4 at second story. There are also two square attic windows in the gable peak.

The main roof is gabled, with overhanging eaves and eave returns that blend with the aluminum rain gutters. There is an inside end-chimney with a corbelled cap at the south (right-hand) end of the main block. Roofing material is blue-green rubber or asphalt tile material.

The rear wing is gable roofed, two bays deep, a very low two-stories high. At first story level there is: (1) a side door with a cantilevered entrance hood, and (2) a small square kitchen window of two lights. At second story level in what must be a room with a very low ceiling, there are two sash windows of 2-over-2 layout.

The north end of the main block is windowless, with a single bay in the north side of the rear wing.

Walls are covered with composition shingle in a strong yellow. The foundation is stone only about a foot of it exposed at the south side of the house.

The porch posts and scroll work have been painted black in contrast with the shingles.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Griffith House is a Victorian style structure standing on a lot laid out for Nicholas R. Merryman by Enoch Dorsey, surveyor, in 1843. (1) Michael D. Merryman conveyed two lots under lease to John Griffith in 1848. (2) The lots in early Hereford were more than building lots, they consisted in this instance of 12 acres in all, and would have provided space for gardening and some pasturage. The 1850 map shows no Griffith House and the 1852 assessment shows no Griffith among the smaller town lots; thus it is difficult to determine when Griffith added a house to the leased property.

A certain date for the existence of a dwelling is 1867, when Griffith assigned the structures of the leased ground to William Coney for \$700. (3) Coney sold to Adaliade Shane in 1868 for \$360. (4) The 1876 tax ledger showed Adeline (sic) Shane with a House and Lot in Hereford worth \$350. (5) She also appears as owner in the 1877 atlas. John H.K. Shane assigned the lot to Augustine D. Clemens, Jr. in 1895 for \$500. (6) The 1896 tax ledger charged Clemens with a Frame Dwelling worth \$400. (7)

Clemens assigned in 1902 for \$300; the lot was 55 by 142 feet at that time. The next owners were Harry G. Esterline and Alline F. Esterline. (8) The 1918 tax ledger showed that the Esterlines adjoined M. Jacob Bull and John E. Foster. The house was shown as:

James W. Blizzard bought the place in 1935, and conveyed to Donald R. Wirtz and wife in 1975. (10) Present owners, Leroy A. Blizzard and Diane F. Blizzard took possession in 1977. (11) This moderately decorated Victorian structure could well date from mid-Century, but the low value of the various assignments and tax statistics make it difficult to be sure that the house is the valuable improvement transmitted in 1867. A conservative estimate would place the structure between 1853 and 1867.


