

shows the house after its initial construction. The house sits a raised stone basement with one-light windows in the south and west basement walls. On the front (south) façade on the first floor, the window in the parlor in the west bay was a multi-light sash and in the west wall there is a square one-light window at the first floor. In the second floor, there is an oriel window on the south façade in the center bay. Above is a decorative frieze with panels and a horizontal course of rosettes. The gable areas on the south and west walls are clad in fish-scale shingles, while the rest of the dwelling is clad in clapboards. Both gable peaks have barge boards. All of the shutters at the windows appear to be operable. The porches have decorative brackets, spindle friezes, turned balusters, and the front porch wraps around the southeast tower. There is a second porch at the southwest corner of the house.

The overall building has a pyramidal roof that is now of asphalt shingles. Projecting from the main block of the house below the roof, the house has 1-bay projecting section containing the oriel window described above in the west bay, which at the east end of the south façade is the pentagonal tower. On the second floor of the south façade is a single horizontal window just below the eave of the roof. The east elevation has three 6-over-1 windows in the first and second floors.

Since the photo was taken changes have been made. The house is now clad in vinyl siding, with replacement windows and fixed shutters. The fish scale cladding in the front porch gable remains in place, but the decorative frieze above the oriel window with two raised panels and a horizontal course of rosettes has been removed. Also, a decorative finial has been added to one of the chimney tops. The one large multi-pane window that was in the parlor has been replaced with a pair of double hung sash windows. The one light window in the second floor on the south wall has been enlarged to be a double-hung sash window, while the one light window in the first floor has been covered by the vinyl siding. Likewise, the projecting shed-roof bay on the south wall has lost its fish scale trim near the shed roof. The five-sided tower and the barge board trim in the two gables remains.

The Michel House (Grimes House) retains integrity of location and setting since it remains on its original lot in Eden Terrace. It also retains its integrity of feeling since it does convey its association with the late nineteenth century Queen Anne Stick-style houses. However, SHA's research did not identify events or persons of local, state or national significance and the Michel House is not eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) under Criteria A (events) or B (persons). With the loss of the windows, including substitution of a different fenestration pattern, and the vinyl siding that obscures original material, the Michel House is not individually eligible for inclusion in the NRHP under Criterion C (architecture). Since it retains its volumetric forms that convey its late nineteenth century design, it is contributing resource to Eden Terrace.

The historic boundary is confined to the 1.57 acres of the tax parcel as shown on Baltimore County Tax Map 101, Parcel 1216, Lot 20.




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
