DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This two story frame structure with attic was built by contractor William A. Cranston in 1883 for John McGrain. In accordance with the original building specifications, this cross-gabled house consists of a two room wide main block measuring approximately 16 x 31 feet, with a back room on the east side measuring approximately 12 x 14 feet. The L-shaped plan was altered in the first part of the 20th century when a pantry was added on the west side of the back (kitchen) room. This addition enclosed the cellar stairs which previously were entered from the outside.

The house, resting on a stone foundation, is covered with brown wooden shingles and is capped with an asphalt shingled cross-gable roof. One brick interior end chimney is located on the west facade of the structure. A porch measuring approximately 7 x 31 feet flanks the main or north facade. Ornamentation on the house is minimal with the exception being the scroll brackets and elliptically carved balusters on the porch.

Fenestration is regular throughout the house. The main block is 3 bays wide and 2 bays deep. The back building, containing the kitchen, is 1 bay wide and 1 bay deep, while the pantry addition is the equivalent of 2 bays by 2 bays.

The first floor of the main or north facade exhibits a 1950's replacement door with the original two pane transom above. Flanking each side of the door are 6/6 double hung sash windows with plain white trim. The attic, located under the cross gable, has a crude lancet-like window.

The fenestration on the west facade contains two 6/6 double hung sash windows with plain trim on both the first and second floors of the main block. The west facade of the pantry addition exhibits a set of glass paneled double doors originally designed for interior use.

The south facade contains irregular fenestration due to the pantry addition. Before the addition was made, this facade exhibited three 6/6 double hung sash windows on both the first and second floors. The pantry now conceals the easterly window on the first floor of the main block. Instead we now see the glass paneled double doors and a small 6/6 sash pantry window.


Fenestration on the first floor of the east facade consists of one 6/6 sash window located in the kitchen (back room). Slightly to the right of that window is a smaller 6/6 sash window, diminished to accomodate the interior stairs. To the

right of this window is a second full size 6/6 double hung sash window with plain white trim. The second floor of this east facade contains three 6/6 double hung sash windows.

The interior of the house, consistent with the exterior, is plain in ornamentation. A rough sketch of the floorplan drawn below shows the layout. The original floorboards and mantel survive.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

With its construction date of 1883, 34 Willow Avenue is one of the oldest, if not the oldest, buildings in the area. As such, the house is important as visual documentation of one of the earliest architectural styles in the neighborhood — the vernacular cross-gable. In addition, the house is significant as one of the least altered homes in the area. It has remained in the hands of one family since its construction, suffering only minor additions and little loss of original fabric.

Aside from its individual architectural merits, however, 34 Willow is significant as an integral part of the surrounding residential neighborhood. In recent years, increased commercialization has threatened Towson's residential character. Many of the private residences which once typified Towson's built environment have been either demolished or altered in such a manner as to destroy their architectural and historic significance. The houses on Willow Avenue and Linden Terrace constitute one of the few relatively unchanged residential areas left in Central Towson. 34 Willow together with the other vernacular buildings on the street provide a visual representation of Towson's earlier character.

Death of an old citizen - Born 1826

Mr. John McGrain, aged 69 years, died at his home in Towson on Wednesday, last. He had been in poor health for a long time. Mr. McGrain was a native of County Meath, Ireland, but had been a resident of this place for thirty years. He was a number of years manager of "Aigburth Vale", when it was the country home of the late John E. Owens. Mr. McGrain leaves a widow (a second wife) and four sons. One of his sons is a policeman on the Baltimore City force. The funeral took place Friday at St. Francis Church where a high mass of requiem was held. Rev. Matthew O'Keefe conducted the funeral service.
