Pembroke Cottage is a two-and-one-half-story, gable-roofed stone building consisting of two T-plan sections. Designed by J. Crawford Neilson and completed in 1892, Pembroke Cottage is the oldest building at Rosewood as well as the first to be built after the founding of the Maryland State Asylum and Training School for the Feeble Minded in 1888.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The Pembroke Cottage, constructed in 1892 and subsequently added onto, is a two and one half story stone building consisting of two T-plan sections. The west section is the original building. Both are built with dark colored stone (although probably originally much lighter) square cut, and laid in regular courses. The brick trim, which is laid in a crenellated pattern around the doors and windows is painted white. The windows are topped by segmental brick arches. Each arm of the two T's is two bays wide and has a gable roof with wide cornices which return at the gable ends.

The windows have 6/6 sash and are paired on the north and south elevations of the newer wing. The west door is set within a recessed arch with a narrow 8/8 sash window to the left of it.

On the south side of the wing separating the two sections is a two story porch supported by four Doric piers; first story piers rest on high brick and stone bases. Beneath the porch is a segmental headed door.

Like the first section, the newer wing has an expressed water table but the stones are somewhat lighter and more irregularly cut. A two story porch wing extends from the east end. The first story of the porch is open and consists of stone piers with brick trim separating wide segmental arches. The second story is enclosed and is reached from the outside by a metal fire-escape. The east door is a double door with a fourteen-pane transom and three-pane sidelights.

There are three shed roofed dormers on the west elevation and one each on the three gable ends of the T plan. Atop the roof is an octagonal cupola with louvered sides topped by a ribbed dome with ball and cone finial.

The Pembroke Cottage is the oldest building at Rosewood Center as well as the first to be built after the founding of the Maryland State Asylum and Training School for the Feeble Minded in 1888.

In 1890 the Board of Visitors at Rosewood began consultation with the architect J. Crawford Neilson of Baltimore concerning the construction of patient buildings. Neilson brought to his commission substantial experience in the construction of institutional buildings in Maryland, having designed the Maryland Hospital for the Insane at Spring Grove, completed in 1874 and the Maryland Institution for the instruction of the Blind in Baltimore. He was also responsible for the Baltimore Academy of Music, Greenmount Chapel, and the Hillman and Calvert Street Stations, all in Baltimore. In 1877, his plan for a "union" almshouse was published in the Report on the Public Charities, Reformatories, Prisons, and Almshouses of the State of Maryland; it incorporated many of the arrangements then popular with progressive architects such as the placement of dining rooms and dormitories for each sex in separate wings, the use of sun-porches, well ventilated corridors and an attached infirmary.

By 1891, Neilson had prepared plans for a new school cottage/dormitory, and in July 1892 the building named Pembroke after J. Pembroke Thom, President of the Board of Visitors, opened for use. The "well built, well planned granite structure" was constructed at a cost of eleven thousand dollars and accommodated forty-five boys, as well as school rooms, and quarters for the teachers and matrons. It greatly expanded the capacity of Rosewood, which heretofore had housed all of its patients and employees in the frame farmhouse (Gundry Cottage) which was already standing on the property when bought in 1888.

In March 1908 an addition was completed on the east end of the building at a cost of \$18,680, increasing the capacity to seventy-five. In 1913 a two story porch was added to the south facade. Although it originally housed male students, by the early 1900s it was a girls dormitory.



8.1 Significance (continued) Pembroke Cottage

Although the Pembroke and Thom Cottages, both by Neilson, began the tradition of stone buildings at Rosewood, they did differ somewhat from the buildings erected thereafter. Both were smaller, had brick trim and were gable-roofed. Nonetheless, they integrated harmoniously with the rest of the complex.


