
A rather simplified version of the Georgian Revival style, this house is squarish in proportion. Three bays on each side are punctuated at the hipped roof line with gabled dormers containing paired one over one sash windows.

At the second floor, above the sidelighted and transomed entrance door, a shallow bay window, projecting under the overhang of the eaves, may be seen which reflects a similar bay window of the first floor side facade. The main windows of the first floor, front facade, are elongated to the porch floor. The porch itself, extending beyond the house to the west has Tuscan type columns, set with plain balustrade railings, which support the porch roof heavily modillioned with rafter ends.

Louvered blinds are hung at the windows.

In general character the house seems to present an example of the use of traditional Lutherville details, including the entrance feature, front porch, elongated front windows, though unusually seen here with one over one sash, and the bay windows as applied to a new house form in 1904.


MELANCTHON AVE.
