Constructed circa 1891, the dwelling known as Valley View Farm is located at 324 Gun Road in Election District One, along the border of Election District Thirteen in Baltimore County. The property is located near Avalon and the site of Dorsey's Forge and the later Avalon Nail and Iron Company. The property was originally part of a twenty-acre tract purchased by Frank Hildebrandt from John C. Smith, along Sulfur Spring Road. The Hildebrandts constructed a dwelling shortly after purchasing the property from Smith's widow in 1880. In 1895, the Hildebrandts defaulted on their mortgage loan and the property was sold at public auction to Eugene Grannan in 1899. Soon thereafter, the property became known as Valley View Farm. After successive ownership by the Gambrills, Ehlers, Wrights, Dames, Schaars, and the Longs, the property passed to the Baldwins, who currently retain ownership, in 1954. Valley View Farm is fashionably detailed in the Queen Anne style.

The Valley View Farm, a late 19th century Queen Anne style dwelling, is sited at the top of a hill that sits back from Gun Road and is accessible by a long, winding driveway that ascends the hill and approaches the south elevation of the house. The two-and-a-half story, five-bay wide, single-pile main block of the building has a two-and-a-half story ell that projects from the north elevation nearly flush with the east elevation. This portion of the building sits on a coursed rubble stone foundation. The first story of the wood frame main block and ell are clad in weatherboard, while the second and attic stories are patterned with square butt and fish-scale wood shingles. A two-story shed-roofed extension projects from the north elevation of the main block. A one-story addition with a shed roof was constructed on the north elevation of the building. Circa 1965, a one-story enclosed porch was added to the north and east elevations of the ell. The main block of the building has a side gable roof with a projecting, intersecting gable peak at the center. Two gabled dormers flank this front-facing gable. A full-width, five-bay wide porch with a hipped roof spans the façade. One interior end brick chimney rises through the roof ridge of the west elevation. The east elevation of the main block is bisected by one shouldered exterior end stretcher bond brick chimney. An off-center exterior end concrete block chimney rises along the north elevation of the ell. To the northwest of the house is a circa 1910 barn. Three additional outbuildings, both of which are non-historic, are in the vicinity of the barn. To the southwest of the house is a rectangular in-ground pool that also dates to the latter half of the 20th century.

The Valley View Farm, a late 19th century Queen Anne style dwelling, constructed circa 1891, is sited at the top of a hill that sits back from Gun Road and is accessible by a long, winding driveway that ascends the hill and approaches the south elevation of the house. The two-and-a-half story, five-bay wide, single-pile main block of the building has a two-and-a-half story ell that projects from the north elevation nearly flush with the east elevation. This portion of the building sits on a coursed rubble stone foundation. The first story of the wood frame main block and ell are clad in weatherboard, while the second and attic stories are patterned with square butt and fish-scale wood shingles. A two-story shed-roofed extension projects from the north elevation of the main block. A one-story addition with a shed roof was constructed on the north elevation of the building. Circa 1965, a one-story enclosed porch was added to the north and east elevations of the ell. The main block of the building has a side gable roof with a projecting, intersecting gable peak at the center. Two gabled dormers flank this front-facing gable. A full-width, five-bay wide porch with a hipped roof spans the façade. One interior end brick chimney rises through the roof ridge of the west elevation. The east elevation of the main block is bisected by one shouldered exterior end stretcher bond brick chimney. An off-center exterior end concrete block chimney rises along the north elevation of the ell. To the northwest of the house is a circa 1910 barn. Three additional outbuildings, both of which are non-historic, are in the vicinity of the barn. To the southwest of the house is a rectangular in-ground pool that also dates to the latter half of the 20th century.

EXTERIOR DESCRIPTION

The façade, or south elevation, is five bays wide with a central entry. The sash-and-paneled double-leaf door is flanked by two 9/9 sidelights and surmounted by a divided transom of a 21-light fixed window flanked by two nine-light fixed windows. Four 2/2 windows pierce the outer bays of the first story. The second story is regularly fenestrated, featuring six 2/2 windows. The central two windows are set close together on a slightly projecting bay. Above these window openings there is a small half-hipped roof supported by four shaped modillions. The front gable peak of the central bay is pierced by two multi-light fixed lunettes. The dormers feature 24/2 vinyl windows. With the exception of the dormer windows, all window openings have wood surrounds and sills. Dominating the façade is the five-bay wide porch. The half-hipped porch roof with a central front-facing gable with a flush wood tympanum is supported by turned wood posts with shaped corner brackets. A geometric wood balustrade that resembles Chippendale-style fretwork joins the posts together.

On the east elevation of the main block there are two 2/2 windows that flank the central exterior end chimney at each of the two main stories. Two one-light fixed windows flank the chimney at the attic story. The second story of the ell, visible above the circa 1965 enclosed porch, is pierced by two 2/2 windows. The enclosed porch has a stretcher bond brick foundation and half-wall. The space above the wall is entirely glazed. The wall is divided into three equal sections by mullions, and each section is divided into nine one-light awning windows. The south side of this porch is glazed with two rows of three one-light awning windows and pierced by one sash-and-paneled door that opens onto a small set of brick steps that descends to the ground.

The north elevation of the main block is pierced at the first story level by one 1/1 window and at the second story by three one-light windows. The north elevation of the ell features a central 2/2 window beside the exterior end concrete block chimney. The one-story addition to the main block is pierced by paired; leaded 24-light double-leaf casements with leaded 24-light fixed transoms. One sash-and-paneled door and nine one-light awning windows above a stretcher bond

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brick half-wall pierce the north elevation of the enclosed porch. The west half of the porch is clad in flush vertical board above the half-wall.

Two 2/2 windows pierce the first story of the west elevation. The second story of the west elevation features two 1/1 vinyl windows. The attic story is pierced by two one-light lunettes that flank a paneled wood mullion. The shed extension to the main block, which sits on a panel-faced cinderblock foundation, is pierced at each of the first, second, and attic stories by one small 1/1 vinyl window.

INTERIOR DESCRIPTION

The dwelling's interior features a central-passage plan with a wide entry hall flanked by two parlors. The stair rises laterally to the north of the west parlor. To the north of the L-plan entry hall, there is a small rectangular study. The kitchen is positioned within the ell. The entry hall is wide, and from it two sets of paneled double-leaf pocket doors open into the two parlors. The window and door casements in the entry hall are molded with paterae cornerblocks. An original eight-and-one-half inch molded baseboard surrounds the perimeter of the room below circa 1960 paneled wainscot with a molded top rail. In addition, the entry hall features a molded wood cornice. The two-and-one-quarter-inch wood floorboards are a replacement of the original flooring. The closed-string, framed newel stair ascends to the west from the north end of the entry hall. The turned newel post is four feet tall with a ball finial. Turned and waisted balusters support the molded handrail.

The ornament in the two parlors is nearly identical. The replacement wood floorboards continue from the entry hall into the two parlors, where the crown molding and mantles are also late 20th century additions. Each room features a circa 1935 Colonial Revival style mantle with an urn and garland motif flanked by shaped brackets that support a shallow mantle shelf. The original window and door casements are molded with paterae cornerblocks. The original baseboards, like those of the stair hall, are eight inches tall and molded.

The study, located at the north end of the entry hall, is an early 20th century addition to the building. The rectangular room features built-in bookshelves and cabinets that were constructed in the mid-1980s. The leaded windows in the room are replacements that had been salvaged from another building. The paneled double-leaf pocket doors that provide entry into the room replace the historic French doors. The replacement window and door casements are molded. The replacement flooring is a continuation of that which spans the entry hall and two parlors.

The kitchen, which is located in the ell, was remodeled in the mid-1960s. The floors are finished with vinyl sheeting. Square stainless steel tiles clad the lower half of the walls, which are then plastered above the tiling. The room features a dropped acoustical tile ceiling, metal cabinetry and a built-in oven and range, all of which date to the 1960s.

A significant portion of the second floor is being rebuilt. Two chambers located above the entry hall and west parlor have been stripped of their interior finishes and reveal the wall studs and third story joists. The remaining rooms of the second story all feature plaster walls, wood floorboards, and molded door and window casements.

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The basement features finishes and some decorative elements added in the 1950s and 1960s. The concrete floor was poured in the early 1950s, and a fireplace was added in the late 1960s. The fireplace surround is composed of a limestone veneer over fieldstone.

OUTBUILDINGS

The circa 1910 wood frame barn is a small T-shaped structure. The main block of the barn has a side gable roof clad in sheet metal. The roof is centrally pierced by a small, square ventilator with louvered wood openings on the sides and a pyramidal roof. Attached to the side of the barn is a rectangular chicken house clad in flush vertical board siding with a front gable roof clad in sheet metal. There are two small round-arched door openings and one flush vertical board single-leaf door on the front of the building. The foundation of the structure was not visible at the time of the survey.

The circa 1980 four-bay wide cinderblock garage, located between the house and barn, has a side gambrel roof clad in asphalt shingles. The structure features three vehicle bays with roll-up metal doors. An exterior end cinderblock chimney bisects the north elevation of the garage. A central gabled wall dormer projects from the façade and features a cross-braced flush vertical board double-leaf door.

To the east of the barn is a circa 1960 well house. The one-bay rectangular wood frame structure is clad in grooved plywood siding and has a side gable roof clad in asphalt shingles. The façade is centrally pierced by one flush single-leaf door flanked by two screened one-light window openings. The building sits on a wood post foundation.

A small, square doghouse is located within a chain link enclosure to the east of the well house. The wood frame doghouse has a shed roof.

To the southwest of the house is an in-ground swimming pool with a concrete deck and patio. The circa 1980 pool is surrounded by a wood fence.

HISTORY

The property known as Hildebrandt House, and later Valley View Farm, was located along what is now Gun Road, which forms the border between the First and Thirteenth Election Districts. Previously the property was part of a much larger 365-acre tract of land owned by John Chandler Smith, known as Waveland, which straddled Sulfur Spring Road.² By 1915, *Bromley's Atlas of Baltimore* refers to the parcel as the property of the Ehlers. The Thirteenth District, of which the property is physically associated, is a 13.86 square mile area bounded on the east by the Middle Branch of the Patapsco River, on the south by the Patapsco River, and on the west by District One and Baltimore City. Gun Road, located in a section of the District known as Avalon, extends approximately one mile through rolling hills and wooded terrain. The road is said to be named for its construction as a route of troop and supply movement from Philadelphia to Virginia by George Washington.³ It begins at Rolling Road, crosses The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad tracks, and extends through the Patapsco Valley State Park to the Patapsco River, which defines Baltimore and Howard Counties. Originally known as Avalon Forge Road, the name was changed after an 1868 flood. Due to the river, the land was extremely fertile and

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numerous crops, including tobacco, were cultivated in the area and shipped from Elkridge, the port city located across the then navigable river. The area was also a manufacturing haven, beginning in 1761 with the establishment of an iron forge by Caleb Dorsey, who was also a part owner of the Elkridge Furnace. Dorsey's Forge, located in what is today the Patapsco State Park, produced crowbars, which were said to be the only iron tools produced entirely in Baltimore County.⁴ The property was later sold to the prominent Ellicott milling family and in 1822 the Avalon Ironworks Company was said to have been established, which produced nails, iron barrel hoops, and train rails.⁵ With the company's incorporation, the area began to be referred to as Avalon. A small picturesque village, with dwellings and a church, emerged with the success of the industries, although many of the buildings were destroyed in the 1868 flood. The Baltimore and Ohio and the Potomac Railroads, which criss-cross the area, were particularly influential in the settlement and the economy.

Due to the railroad, which also provided passenger service, and seven trains a day, to Avalon Station until 1949, numerous dwellings began to appear, many of which were subdivided from the land holdings of John Chandler Smith. The area became a popular retreat from city life in Baltimore and many built summer and weekend homes in the nearby wooded hills. This growth was described in a Towson new clipping dated 1891, which states: "Quite an extensive colony has grown up in the Thirteenth District known as Avalon. The place is situated on the Avalon Forge Road, which leads from Catonsville to Avalon Station, on the B. & O. R.R., and through the personal efforts of Mr. A. Robinson White, a well known and prominent member of the Baltimore bar, who moved from the First District of Howard County, several advantageous lots have been effected. Mr. White built a neat house for himself, and by his example was the means of encouraging a general and steady improvement. Among the purchasers were Mr. Frank M. Hildebrandt, who secured 20 acres of land, and is now putting a handsome dwelling and stable on it, and will reside on the property throughout the year."⁶

Originally constructed circa 1891 by Frank Hildebrandt, Valley View Farm was designed in the Queen Anne Style, which was popular in America from 1880 to 1910. The style, which grew out of Victorian England under the influence of architect Robert Norman Shaw, was popular in America after the 1876 Centennial Celebration in Philadelphia. The identifying characteristics of the style include multiple gable roofs, projecting oriel windows, towers, use of varying materials, multi-light windows, spindel-work, wrap-around porches, non-symmetrical fenestration, and an open plan. Valley View Farm is a vernacular interpretation of the style, which includes a projecting center gable, turned-post supported porch, various exterior cladding materials including fishscale and square-butt wood shingles, and multi-light windows. In 1895, the Hildebrandts defaulted on their mortgage loan and the property was sold at public auction to Eugene Grannan in 1899. The Gambrills sold the property to the Ehlers in 1908 when it was subdivided into two parcels, according to a Baltimore *News* article.⁷ After successive ownership by the Wrights, Dames, Schaars and Longs, the property was purchased in 1954 by the Baldwins, who currently retain ownership of the 14.5-acres.⁸








