Constructed circa 1820, the Gray Dawn Farm is located in the Second District of Baltimore County between the village of Tyler in the west and Reisterstown in the east. Reisterstown, a turnpike town located at the intersection of roads leading to Baltimore, Westminster, and Hanover, is named for John Reister, who settled the area in 1758. On the 1850 Sidney Map, Gray Dawn Farm is denoted as the residence of Sylvester Baseman and, according to the Hopkins Atlas, the Baseman family still owned the farm in 1877. During this time the town's population doubled from 500 in 1850, to 1000 by 1896 and contained a number of community organizations. In 1915, when the growth of the community slowed, the Bromley Atlas denotes N. Noyler as the owner of the property.

Facing North and sited back from Deer Park Road on a flat grassy lot, this two-story, three-bay, Greek Revival dwelling was constructed circa 1820. The random-rubble foundation and walls are constructed with local fieldstone and feature stone quoins. The three bays, two-story porch shades the recessed central entry and two 2-leaf, 2-light French doors. The flat porch roof is supported on wood Tuscan columns and pilasters. The center recessed entry features a wood paneled door beneath a 6-light transom flanked by two-light sidelights. The façade features three 6/6 double-hung wood sash windows, one of which is in the central section of a projecting canted-bay on the second story. Two interior-end stone chimneys rise above the asphalt shingle clad side gable roof. Other features of the dwelling include stone sills and lintels, overhanging eaves, and a wood soffit. A one-story wood-frame addition with a half-hipped roof extends from the west elevation and a two-story wood-frame addition is located at the rear of the house. The property includes three historic buildings, one non-historic building, and one non-historic structure.

Prepare both a one paragraph summary and a comprehensive description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

Dating to circa 1820, this two-story, three-bay, Greek Revival dwelling, accessible by a gravel driveway, is sited back from Deer Park Road on a level, grassy farmstead with trees, shrubs and foundation plantings. The random-rubble foundation and walls are constructed with local stone and the feature stone quoins. The center recessed entry features a wood paneled door beneath a six-light transom, and flanked by two-light sidelights. Flanking the main entrance are two-leaf French doors. The second story features a projecting canted-bay window with paneling and a 6/6 double-hung wood sash window, set between two 6/6 double-hung wood sash window. Each opening has a stone sill and wide stone lintel. Across the façade is a two-story Greek Revival-style porch. It is supported with wood Tuscan columns and pilasters. It features a flat roof and a plain wood cornice. The house has overhanging eaves with a wood soffit and a side-gable roof clad with asphalt shingles. Two interior end stone chimneys rise above the roof.

A one-story wood-frame addition, circa 1920, extends from the west elevation. Sitting on a random rubble foundation, the addition has a half-hipped roof with asphalt shingles. A second addition, constructed during the last half of the twentieth century, extends from the rear elevation. This wood-frame addition sits on a stone foundation and is clad in aluminum siding.

The property includes three historic buildings, one non-historic building, and one non-historic structure. A small one story, one-bay smokehouse, circa 1820, is constructed with local stone, and features stone quoins. The center entry contains a vertical-board door with a large stone lintel. The front gable is covered with asphalt shingles. The roof of this structure is not original and features a wood cornice, overhanging eaves and exposed rafters. A wood frame, two-story, five-bay dairy barn, circa 1870, is clad with wood weatherboards. The barn features overhanging eaves with exposed rafters supporting a side gable, standing-seam metal roof. A stone ramp leads to the sliding vertical board doors. A wood frame, board-and-batten stable dates circa 1900. The stable has a boxed wood cornice, overhanging eaves, exposed rafters and a side-gable roof with asphalt shingles. This building also features a braced vertical board sliding door.

The non-historic structures include a wood-frame silo with a metal dome roof, and a circa 1970 wood-frame single dwelling resting on a concrete block foundation. This two-and-a-half story dwelling is clad in aluminum siding and capped with a side gable roof with asphalt shingles. The house has an exterior-end brick chimney, and a second story wood gallery with turned posts. A shed roof addition was constructed to the side elevation.

Set back from the road and facing north, the Gray Dawn Farm was constructed circa 1820 near the historic village of Tyler on the west and Reisterstown on the east. This farm is located in the Second District of Baltimore County. The 18th century community of Reisterstown is named for John Reister, who settled "Reister's Desire" in 1758. Shortly thereafter he laid out Reister's Town Road, along which he established a tavern for travelers passing through on their way to Baltimore. Reisterstown was strategically located at the intersection of roads leading to Baltimore, Westminster, and Hanover, thus lending importance to the community as a turnpike town. In the 1810s, the condition of Reisterstown Road significantly improved when the Baltimore and Reisterstown Turnpike Company completed construction along the route. (1) By 1850, Reisterstown's importance along the turnpike was evident by the considerable development of the community. Numerous buildings, including dwellings, taverns, and other commercial structures, were located along the Reisterstown Turnpike. Immediately north of the intersection of the Reisterstown Turnpike and the Westminster Turnpike was the tavern operated by Jeremiah Ducker. (2) At that time, the town's population had reached 500, and Reisterstown appeared slated for further growth. (3) By 1881, the population had reached 600, and establishments in the town included one public school, three private schools, three seminaries, Catholic, Lutheran, and Methodist Episcopal churches, and several fraternal and benevolent orders. (4) By 1896, the population had reached 1,000. (5) The 1915 county atlas indicates that further growth in the community slowed. By that time, the neighboring communities of Delight and Owings Mills began to expand on the south side of Reisterstown. (6) Through the 20th century, the town has become a suburb of Baltimore City.

The Gray Dawn Farm is denoted on the 1850 Sidney Map as the residence of Sylvester Baseman.(7) In 1877, S.W. Baseman, was shown on the Hopkins Atlas. (8) The 1915 Bromley Atlas denotes N. Noyler at this property along Deer Park Road. (9)


