DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Bachelor's Choice is a stone house, four bays in length, two stories in height, its principle facade to the south. Approximately centered, a stone kitchen wing extends to the north, two bays in length, two stories in height. The house and its kitchen wing appear to be coeval; a painted inscription in an arched recessed panel high on the east gable

is consistent with the basic form of the house and its original details.. A two story frame addition fills the northwest angle between the house and its kitchen wing, its roof an extension of the kitchen's westerly slope. Although its materials differ, this later construction matches the style of the original.

A one story hipped roof porch with Tuscan columns extends across the south front and east end and a porch with turned columns and jig sawn brackets shelters the east side of the kitchen wing.

All roofs are gabled and terminate in flush end chimneys of brick; roofs are covered with standing seam tin. There are no rake overhangs.. Matching six-panel doors with five-light transoms are in the two middle bays of the south front and windows through out are 6/6 with narrow beaded frames and louvered blinds. Masonry above all openings is supported by brick jack arches, those of the second story south front having brick imposts at either end.

The two front doors open into a pair of rooms joined with a wide opening formally with double doors. The staircase rises, open, to the second floor in the northwest corner of the house; its moulded rail is supported by slim turned newels and round tapered balusters. Beaded architraves are of two planes without a backband. Matching mantels, wood cornice work and chair railing are all modern. The original kitchen retains its large cooking fireplace and an enclosed winding stair ascends to the second and attic floors east of the fireplace. A supboard occupies the space west of the chimney.

Question #7 Description, Continued

The second floor plan is similar and the original mantels with plain pilasters supporting a plain frieze remain in place. The entire attic is roughly plastered, probably as an early insulation effort although it may have been used as sleeping quarters in spite of its very low head room; small windows flank each of the three chimneys in the gable ends to provide light and ventilation.

A two storey spring house with smokehouse above is built into the hillside immediately north of the house. The roof cantilevers over the south gable to shelter an exterior wood staircase to the upper storey.

An early one storey carriage house of wood frame west of the house has been adapted as a garage.
