This Federal-style house is located near historic village of Armacost in the Fifth District of Baltimore County, and is associated with the town of Hampstead. Armacost started out as a crossroads community in the last half of the 19th century when after the turn of the 20th century it gained the name Armacost. According to the 1915 atlas it was served by a school, and had a sawmill to the east. The Fifth District is located in the northwest corner of Baltimore County and is historically known for its abundant waterpower and timber that spurred construction of sawmills, paper mills, and flour mills, making this an industrial region of the county. Located along Grace Road, this house was constructed circa 1820. It appears Grace Road was macadamized sometime following the 1877 atlas, possibly around the turn of the 20th century. Although an exact date of construction for the house has not been determined, historic maps and architectural evidence support a circa 1820 date. The house first appears on the 1850 Sidney Atlas as occupied by Calub Price, and then by W. Fowble by the 1877 Hopkins Atlas.

Set on a stone foundation, the brick house features stretcher bond construction. It rises two stories in height and is topped by a side gable roof of pressed metal shingles. The first story of the façade or west elevation is four bays in width and features two single-leaf wood doors that are paneled with two-lights apiece. A one-light transom caps each entry. These entries, centrally located on the façade, are flanked by 2/2 windows with wood sills and brick jack arch lintels. The second story openings mimic those on the first story, with four evenly spaced 2/2 windows, also with wood sills and brick jack arch lintels. A one-story, three-bay wide porch with a half-hipped, standing seam metal roof and Tuscan post supports further details the façade. There are three interior end brick chimneys, two of which have been rebuilt and the third, which features a corbeled cap. The L-shaped house has two additions: a one-story wood frame addition with a shed roof on the rear of the house and a wood frame addition that serves as a vestibule on the north elevation. The property additionally features four historic outbuildings, including a dairy barn, a silo, a smokehouse, a drive-through hay barn, and another barn.

Located on a sloping lot and surrounded by fields, the Federal-style house was constructed circa 1820. Set on a stone foundation, the brick house features stretcher bond construction. It rises two stories in height and is topped by a side gable roof of pressed metal shingles. The first story of the façade or west elevation is four bays in width and features two single-leaf wood doors that are paneled with two-lights apiece. A one-light transom caps each entry. These entries, centrally located on the façade, are flanked by 2/2 windows with wood sills and brick jack arch lintels. The second story openings mimic those on the first story, with four evenly spaced 2/2 windows, also with wood sills and brick jack arch lintels. A one-story, three-bay wide porch with a half-hipped, standing seam metal roof and Tuscan post supports further details the façade. There are three interior end brick chimneys, two of which have been rebuilt and the third, which features a corbeled cap. The L-shaped house has two additions: a one-story wood frame addition with a shed roof on the rear of the house and a wood frame addition that serves as a vestibule on the north elevation.

The property additionally features four historic outbuildings, including a dairy barn, a silo, a smokehouse, a drive-through hay barn, and another barn. The circa 1900 dairy barn is one-and-a-half stories in height and two bays in width. Set on a stone foundation, the wood frame barn is clad in standing seam metal and features a nine-light casement window and a double-leaf, vertical board sliding door. It is covered with a side gable roof of standing seam metal. Numerous additions have been constructed surrounding the dairy barn.

Adjacent to the barn is a circa 1930 metal silo that rises approximately forty feet high and is capped by a domical roof.

The smokehouse, dating to the same period as the house, is constructed of brick laid in stretcher bond on a stone foundation. The brick appears to have been repointed. The front gable roof is clad in standing seam metal with overhanging eaves. There is a single-leaf vertical board door.

The drive-through hay barn, constructed circa 1900, features a random rubble stone foundation and a wood frame structural system that is clad in vertical boards. The side gable, standing seam metal roof has overhanging eaves. A section of the hay barn appears to be used as a corncrib.

The third barn on the property was constructed circa 1930 and features vertical board cladding and an off-center, side gable roof with standing seam metal. The foundation is partially stone and partially cinderblock. It features a single-leaf sliding door and three window openings.


