

**CAPSULE SUMMARY**

**Circa 1850**

This house was located to the north of the historic village of Butler and is now associated with the town of Hampstead in the Fifth District of Baltimore County. The locality of the village of Butler is at the southern edge of the district. During the late nineteenth century Black Rock Methodist Episcopal church and the J.H. Millender mills were located here. The Fifth District is historically known for its abundant waterpower and timber that spurred construction of sawmills, paper mills, and flour mills, making this an industrial region of the county. Although an exact date of construction for the house has not been determined, historic maps and architectural evidence support a circa 1850 date.

This large farm property is nestled among a rural rolling landscape with landscaping, two man-made ponds, and wood rail fences lining the fields. The two-story dwelling is on a sloping grassy lot with foundation plantings and is surrounded by mature trees and shrubs. A long paved driveway leads to house. The original house sits on a solid random rubble stone foundation and is brick masonry with a stretcher veneer. The original house has been altered by several two-story wood frame additions. These additions altered the façade of the original house such as removing the entrance. The additions to the house are clad with vinyl siding. Eight windows pierce the entire façade; three 9/9 double-hung vinyl sash, four 9/9 double-hung wood sash, and one 8-sided 9-light vinyl fixed window. The original house features brick jack arch lintels. One single-leaf wood paneled door provide access from the façade. An ell addition on the façade has a brick foundation and is three bays wide with a center entry. A two-story addition is located on the southeast elevation and sits on a brick foundation. The cross gable roof is sheathed with asphalt shingles with three interior-end brick chimneys. Three historic and four non-historic outbuildings and one structure are associated with this property.

This large farm property is nestled among a rural rolling landscape with landscaping, two man-made ponds, and wood rail fences lining the fields. The two-story dwelling is on a sloping grassy lot with foundation plantings and is surrounded by mature trees and shrubs. A long paved driveway leads to house. The original house sits on a solid random rubble stone foundation and is brick masonry with a stretcher veneer. The original house has been altered by several two-story wood frame additions. These additions altered the façade of the original house such as removing the entrance. The additions to the house are clad with vinyl siding. Eight windows pierce the entire façade; three 9/9 double-hung vinyl sash, four 9/9 double-hung wood sash, and one 8-sided 9-light vinyl fixed window. The original house features brick jack arch lintels. One single-leaf wood paneled door provide access from the façade. An ell addition on the façade has a brick foundation and is three bays wide with a center entry. A two-story addition is located on the southeast elevation and sits on a brick foundation. The cross gable roof is sheathed with asphalt shingles with three interior-end brick chimneys.

Three historic outbuildings are associated with this property. First, a circa 1850 springhouse in good condition is one-story high and one bay wide. It sits on a solid random rubble foundation and is of log construction using saddle notches. It has one single-leaf door, which is not visible. The overhanging front gable is clad with board-and-batten siding and the roof is covered with wood shingles. The stone chinking is whitewashed.

Next, is a circa 1850 log smokehouse one story high and one bay wide with V-notching. It has a single-leaf vertical board door, a boxed wood cornice, and a front gable roof covered with wood shingles.

A bank barn circa 1880 sits on a stone foundation and is wood frame and reclad with vertical boards. It has a side gable roof covered with asphalt shingles. A high drive leads to a sliding single-leaf vertical board door. It has a shed addition and a circa 1990 side gable wing with wood slatted vents with pedimented surrounds.

The wood frame tractor/hay shed from circa 1960 has a gable asphalt shingle roof and is clad with vertical boards with an open bay. Next, is a 1980s hayshed clad with board-and-batten siding with an open bay and capped with an off-center side gable roof sheathed with standing-seam metal. Then, there is a 1980s shed with vertical board siding, a two-leaf vertical board door, and a side gable asphalt shingle roof. Finally, there is a prefabricated 1990s shed clad with pressed vertical boards. It is one story high and one bay wide with a gambrel asphalt shingle roof. There is one concrete in-ground pool circa 1980s on the property.

Millender mills were located here.<sup>1</sup> The Fifth District is located in the northwest corner of Baltimore County and is historically known for its abundant waterpower and timber that spurred construction of sawmills, paper mills, and flour mills, making this an industrial region of the county. Located along Black Rock Road, this house was constructed circa 1850. Although an exact date of construction for the house has not been determined, historic maps and architectural evidence support a circa 1850 date.


