- 453 ST. JAMES RECTORY** - 1836 - 3101 Monkton Road, (west side) NW of the church. Built by Vestry in 1837 and ready for painting by December 11, 1837. Total cost was \$1,472.15½. The Rev. James McGregor Dale was the first incumbent to occupy the rectory. Stone house in plain style; the exterior, formerly coated with stucco has been faced with modern brick. Not at present occupied by the rector but rented out. (1975).
- 454 FOXGLOVES** - 1800s - East side of Old York Road, 0.6 mile north of Hess Road. Small, 1-½ story frame, clapboarded, tenant cottage in vernacular style, enlarged with a stone wing constructed in 1974 with 18th century materials, including a Palladian front door. Double hanging rear porches. Owners: Mr. and Mrs. Frank Weller (1978).
- 499 SAMPSON'S LOT** - c. 1825 - West side of Old York Road, 0.2 mile south of Houcks Mill Road. Two-story, three-bay, log and frame house with wings. Probably built by William Hutchins. Vernacular style. Owners: Ms. Garnett and Ms. Helen Hutchins.
- 500 NELSON HOUSE** - Pre-1877 - West side of Hutchins Mill Road, 0.5 mile north of Hess Road. Three-story frame house, gable roof, rear wing. Vernacular style. Shown as Nathan Nelson's in 1877 atlas, and Josh. Nelson's in 1898 Bromley atlas. Owners: Mr. and Mrs. Arthur S. Nelson.
- 501 MILES ROSS PATTERSON HOUSE** - Before 1877 - East side of Manor Road opposite junction of Old York Road. Also called Manor View Farm, it appears in 1877 atlas as Geo. Shelley house. Large, 2-½ story frame house with gable roof and dormers; covered with composition shingles.
- 502 T. C. PRICE HOUSE** - Before 1850 - South side of 15156 Manor Road, 0.4 mile north of Jarrettsville Pike, the N. Parker house of 1850 map, the F. Bloom house of 1877 atlas, and H. N. Parker house of 1898 and 1915 Bromley atlases. Old stone house with frame wings; excellent condition; vernacular style, gable roof.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE	
<p>Greenbank Farm is a weatherboarded frame, two storey, five bay symmetrical house with a one storey shed roofed porch extending clear across its principal (southeast, hereinafter called south) front; extending behind the left or west end of the main house, in a northerly direction, is a two storey, two bay wood wing; behind that is another two storey, four bay wood wing; finally extending westerly from the north end is a four bay, one and one-half storey wood wing.</p> <p>All windows are 6/6 and have louvered blinds. A transom and side-lights surround the principal entrance.</p> <p>In the main section of the house, a small center hall, with its principal stair extending to the third floor, is flanked by a single room on either side, each with a very simple pilastered mantel. Trim is plain, with frieze and cornice at the top. The round walnut handrail is supported by a massive turned walnut newel and turned balusters.</p> <p>The stone walled cellar extends under the front section of the house only. All first floor joists are dimensionally sawn, with sawn or hewn principal members and sills.</p> <p>The entire front section appears to have been built as a complete portion, of rather traditional design, ca. 1870. It retains a high percentage of original work, including the porch.</p> <p>The first or southerly section of the rear wing has leg joists, upon a complete stone foundation visible from a crawl space beneath. The easterly five feet (+ or -) of the crawl space is separated by a stone foundation, and the leg joists are not continuous over this portion. Externally, and in the two storeys above, these five feet appear as an addition to the original wing which measured about 18 by 20 feet. The chimney is centered on the original portion, at the north end, and its first storey fireplace is large, although not of "cooking" dimensions.</p> <p>This apparent addition is incorporated into the first storey room, but partitions mark it in the second storey. The east and south walls of the wing are about 10 inches thick, and there appear to be two walls -- one of the wing and one of the main house -- where the two sections join. ← The west wall of this section does not appear to be exceptionally thick.</p> <p>In the second floor of this middle section, west of the chimney, a patch in the floor suggests a location for a winding staircase; a notch suggests the location of the newel from which the steps radiated.</p> <p>The four bay wing which continues northerly from the middle section measures about 18 feet by 39½ feet; an internal step in the floor south of its mid-point suggests that it was built in two stages; the northerly half has a cellar, and first floor structure appears to be of the 20th century.</p> <p>Finally, the west wing, measuring about 19 by 31 feet, appears as though it, too, may have been built in two stages, each about of identical size, suggested by an irregularity in the roof.</p> <p>The 1798 Federal Direct Tax records a one storey log dwelling 18 by 18 with a one storey log kitchen 19 by 18. The several sections (except for the main front section) with their apparent subdivisions, are all related to these dimensions. Wall constructions cannot be determined at this time, however, and interior finishes are of very simple designs, dating from the late 19th and the 20th centuries.</p>

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			
<p>Greenbank Farm is a ramblin, old, weatherboard house, the first portion of which was probably built prior to 1800.</p> <p>Lot 11 of My Lady's Maner was sold at the auction of confiscated lands to Thomas Price for Robert Smith (-1) and a deed was issued to Robert Smith for 116 acres (-2) No patent for this lot can be found. In the 1798 Direct Federal Tax Assessment, Robert Smith is described as having 148 acres which contained a dwelling house of logs, measuring 18 X 18 and a kitchen measuring 18 X 19.(-3) Some of the dimensions of portions of the four bay wing of this house correspond to these measurements, and probably represent the remains of the original structure. There has been much added to the original structure at various dates as reviewed in the architectural survey.</p> <p>In the north east corner of this property is a marker stone marking the junction of lots 11, 12, 13 and 34.</p> <p>The house is presently owned by Mrs. Elizabeth J. 
