The Howell house is a dwelling of traditional form with touches of current style in its turret, its central gable, its bay window and its interior detailing. It is located on a commanding hilltop site. Long the farm of the John Chilcoat family, this dwelling replaced an earlier "old log house" listed in the 1896 tax assessment. It was probably erected shortly after 1900 when the total interest in the 150 acre farm was deeded to John Thomas Chilcoat by the heirs of John Chilcoat.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Howell House is a two and one-half storey frame house five bays in length with a two and one-half storey frame wing extending to the north behind and approximately centered on the main house. A one-storey shed-roofed porch extends across the principal or south front; above the porch the center bay breaks out as a bay window, its roof a steep, octagonal pyramid and it is flanked by a single dormer on either side. One-storey shed-roofed porches flank the rear wing; in the westerly roof of the rear wing is a steep pediment above that wing's central bay. A one-storey hipped roof bay window is centered on the east end of the main house and a small wing of one-storey, two bays, extends easterly from the southerly bay of the rear wing. A pair of single-flue brick chimneys rises from the main roof ridge flanking the central bay, a third rises from the middle of the rear wing and a fourth rises internally at the east end of the small east wing. Exterior walls are covered with asbestos shingles, the roofs with standing-seam tin.

Windows in the main house are 1/1, except for the dormers which are 2/2; windows of the rear wing are 2/2 and the window in the west pediment is arched. All windows, except those of the attic storey, are flanked with louvred blinds.

The structure appears to date from ca. 1890-1905.

A central hall extends through the middle bay of the main house, flanked by a single room on either side. In the hall, the

principal stair rises to the second floor, its detailing of the Queen Anne period with massive turned cherry newels, moulded rails and turned chestnut balusters on a closed string. The west room has a painted slate mantel, incised and carved in Eastlake-type designs, formally fitted with a Latrobe stove. The rear wing is two rooms in length and a secondary stair rises to the attic enclosed with winders, west of the central chimney. The second floor plan is similar to the first, but detailing is simpler. A stone-walled cellar extends under the entire house.

North of the house is a large frame bank barn on a concrete block foundation, the latter being considerably later than the barn itself, being constructed of circular sawn timbers joined with mortise and tenon. The loft or upper storey is accessible on grade along the east side of the barn.

West of the barn is a frame grainery; the driveway through the ground storey is flanked by a corn crib on the north, a wagon shed on the south. Its hewn timber frame is joined with mortise and tenon.
