Fairview is located near Monkton in the Seventh District of Baltimore County near the border of the Tenth District. Arable fields for plantings of wheat, corn, oats, and fruits supported the district. It was known for its dairy production and the breeding of cattle. In addition, the waterpower of the Gunpowder Falls and its tributaries supported numerous farms and mills throughout the district. R.A. Ramare was the builder of this dwelling and was a patron of the 1877 Atlas, and is also noted on the 1915 Bromley Atlas with 220 acres. He is described with having an occupation as a farmer in the 1877 Atlas. The atlas explains that Ramare immigrated from Tours, France in 1854. The previous MHT field survey form detailed that he was President Jackson's chef and the dwelling is shown as new in the 1855 Transfer book.

Facing south, this Greek Revival dwelling is surrounded by several mature trees on a sloping grassy lot. It rests on a solid random rubble stone foundation and is constructed of the same with short and long quoins on each corner. It is two-and-a-half stories high and five bays wide featuring a central passage plan, and a T-shaped footprint. The façade is illuminated with nine 6/6 double-hung wood sash windows, and accessed with a double-leaf wood panel-and-light door. Rising above the cross-gable roof are two interior end brick corbeled chimneys. The roof is covered with standing-seam metal. The doorway is illuminated with a 6-light transom and 3-light sidelights over a dado panel. Features of the house include flat wood lintels, square-edged sills, overhanging eaves, and scroll-sawn eave brackets. A porch on the façade has been removed. Associated with this property are an historic root cellar, bank barn, tractor shed, barn, garage, and silo, in addition to a non-historic tenant house, corn crib, and dog shelter.

Facing south, this Greek Revival dwelling is surrounded by several mature trees on a sloping grassy lot. A long paved driveway leads to this house. It rests on a solid random rubble stone foundation and is constructed of the same with short and long quoins on each corner. It is two-and-a-half stories high and five bays wide featuring a central passage plan, and a T-shaped footprint. The façade is illuminated with nine 6/6 double-hung wood sash windows, and accessed with a double-leaf wood panel-and-light door. Rising above the cross-gable roof are two-interior end brick corbeled chimneys. The roof is covered with standing-seam metal. The doorway is illuminated with a 6-light transom and 3-light sidelights over a dado panel. Features of the house include flat wood lintels, square-edged sills, overhanging eaves, and scroll-sawn eave brackets. A porch on the façade has been removed.

Associated with this property are an historic root cellar, bank barn, tractor shed, barn, garage, and silo, in addition to a non-historic tenant house, corn crib, and dog shelter. The root cellar dates circa 1860 and is one story high and one bay wide constructed of random rubble stone. It is capped with a front gable roof sheathed with asphalt shingles. The house features one single-leaf vertical board door, exposed roof rafters, and quoins.

The circa 1860 wood-frame bank barn is two-and-a-half stories high and sits on a random rubble stone foundation. It is clad with weatherboards and is illuminated with two 35-light fixed wood windows. It also features seven window openings that contain wood louvered vents. The façade has one single-leaf vertical board door, which is located in the upper story. The side-gable roof is clad with corrugated sheet metal. It has numerous additions to several elevations.

The wood frame garage, dates circa 1950 and is clad with board-and-batten siding. It is capped with a side gable roof covered with corrugated sheet metal. It has one 6-light awning window and two open bays.

The tractor shed dates circa 1950 and sits on a random rubble stone foundation and is clad with vertical board siding. The front gable roof is covered with corrugated sheet metal and features exposed roof rafters. It has a single-leaf sliding vertical board door. There is a circa 1950 metal stave silo with a dome roof associated with this property.

Next, is a board-and-batten dog shelter constructed circa 1980. It is one story high and measures five bays across. It is capped with a shed roof. Finally, the corn crib is a metal and wire container constructed circa 1980 and capped with a conical corrugated sheet metal roof.

Fairview is located near Monkton in the Seventh District of Baltimore County near the border of the Tenth District. The Seventh District was one of the largest and most populated regions of the county in the latter part of the 19th century, which had an area of 59.93 square miles and a population of 3,074 by 1870. It is bounded on the north by Pennsylvania, the south by the Eighth District, the east by Harford County, and the west by the Fifth and Sixth Districts. Arable fields for plantings of wheat, corn, oats, and fruits supported the district. It was known for its dairy production and the breeding of cattle. In addition, the waterpower of the Gunpowder Falls and its tributaries supported numerous farms and mills throughout the district. R.A. Ramare was the builder of this dwelling and was a patron of the 1877 Atlas, and is also noted on the 1915 Bromley Atlas with 220 acres.^{1,2} He is described with having an occupation as a farmer in the 1877 Atlas. 

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Fairview is a two storey stone house of five bays facing a long and impressive view over the Big Gunpowder valley to the south; it has a rear wing of four bays centered on the three middle bays. The gabled roofs have relatively low pitches. The rear wing has a plain wood cornice, but the front section of the house has a wide cornice, at the eaves, and extending up the rakes, supported by rather closely spaced scrolled brackets. Flush chimneys are at each end of the main roof; an interior chimney rises from the east slope of the roof, toward its north end. A one storey shed roofed porch, with wood columns of the Tuscan order, extends across the principal or south front, and a similar porch once extended across the west side of the rear wing; it is now missing, and the door to it from the southerly bay of the wing has been converted to a window.

Lintels in the south facade, in the first storey, under the porch ceiling are wood, hacked as though intended for plaster. All other lintels are single pieces of fieldstone, roughly shaped. Windows are 6/6, with louvred blinds, generally, but the first storey windows of the rear wing have paneled shutters, with two unmoulded, raised panels in each. The principal entrance, centered on the south facade, has a transom and sidelights.

In the center hall the principal stair rises to the second floor. A turned walnut newel of moderate size, and turned balusters, support the flattened moulded walnut rail. Step ends are scrolled.

Architraves are plain, beaded, with plain corner blocks. Doors are four paneled, moulded. The mantel in the west room has plain pilasters and frieze, with slim free-standing columns further supporting the wide shelf, perhaps added later. The mantel of the east room has slim moulded pilasters, tapered and inverted, supporting a frieze with a panel of reeding. Probably inspired by mantels of the early 19th century, this example is probably contemporary with the house.

The unusually-wide rear wing allows two rooms in width. The original kitchen, in the northwest corner, has a cooking fireplace on its east wall, behind which is a smaller service room in the northeast room, each with an exterior door to the north. Approximately centered on the north wall is the back stair which winds clear to the attic.

Second storey, and rear wing, details are simpler, as expected. In the second storey, only the west room has a fireplace; in its mantel, plain pilasters support a plain frieze, a moulding and a shelf. Other chimneys are single flues for stoves.

The attic of the rear wing is simply finished with plaster walls and sloping ceilings; the width of the wing allows minimal headroom, but the attic of the narrower front section is unfinished.

In the stone walled cellar, which extends under the front section of the house only, a double floor may be observed. Ledgers nailed to the sides of the straight-sawn joists support short boards, on which a layer of mortar was laid beneath the finished flooring, for insulation.

Traditionally built by President Andrew Jackson's retired French chef, a date of no earlier than 1845 has been conjectured. It is slightly earlier in character than a group of similar buildings in and around Monkton, conjectured to date from the years immediately after the Civil War, but it is closely related to them.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Fairview is important because it represents an excellent example of mid-19th century building on My Lady's Manor.

This land, lot 67, had been previously owned by William Gwynn, although no building here remains from that period. It is said that there was a log structure on the property prior to the presently existing building, but no evidence of that structure can be found. This property came into the possession of Gersuch family following the death of William Gwynn and in 1846 lot 67 as well as a number of other Gersuch properties were sold by John Arnold to Elisha P. Horne. (-1)

On the 1859 map a house appears at this location and the name of E.P. Horne is listed as its owner. It seems unusual that the same man should build this house and the Stationmaster's house at about the same time, but they both appear on the 1850 map with the same name. There is no mention of a house or no indication of a structure in the transaction transferring the property from Arnold to Horne.

Local legend suggests that the present house was built by Richard Antoine Remare, the chef of President Andrew Jackson. Horne sold this property to Remare in 1852. (-2) The structure shown on the 1850 map may have been the old log structure no longer in existence, and the present house built by Remar. This makes more sense than the theory that Horne built two houses in different places in six years and then sold the larger of the two to Remare.


