

- BA- 936 DR. CUMMINS PLACE - 1825-1850 - Upper Glencoe Road, north side, 0.5 mile east of York Road. Two-segment, L-shaped house in Federal style, main block frame and clapboard, 2-½ stories high, three bays wide, with half windows at attic level. Prominent cornice; quarter-round windows in gable ends, flanking the outside end-chimneys. Off-center entrance with transom. Small entry porch with open, second-floor deck. Smaller segment of house is two bays wide, two stories, long under clapboard, and is probably the oldest part. Gable roofing on both parts. Enclosed rear porch. Stands on tracts Gorsuch's Retirement and "Sign of Panthers" acquired in 1826 by Philip Pearce from Edward Gorsuch. Not on 1850 map but shown as Dr. T. (Thomas) G. Pearce's in 1877 atlas. Acquired in 1892 and Samuel Bacon who appears as owner in atlases of 1898 and 1915. Estate was called "Edgewood" in 1918 tax ledger. Acquired by present owner, a resident of Rye, New York, in 1954. Owner: Dr. F. Mitchell Cummins, c/o property manager, LeRoy A. Haile, Jr., Towson.
- BA - 936A DR. CUMMINS PLACE BARN - Large stone bank barn, 61 x 25 feet with tin gable roof and frame overhang above the stalls was disassembled in 1976 after it was condemned. Timbers were hand hewn and hand-pegged types.
- BA - 936B DR. CUMMINS PLACE SLAVE QUARTERS - Small, squarish, one-story stone building, renovated in recent years. Also called an overseer's house, it had served as a chicken coop.
- BA - 936C DR. CUMMINS PLACE CARRIAGE HOUSE - West of main house. Converted to a dwelling by Mrs. Cummins. Now rented out.
- BA - 936D DR. CUMMINS PLACE SPRING HOUSE/ROOT CELLAR - West of house, a "wet cellar" dug out of an earth bank with channel for spring water.
- BA - 936E DR. CUMMINS PLACE, OTHER BUILDINGS - There are two sheds in board and batten, one of which is a combined shed and small barn; both on stone foundations.
