The public library faces south onto 4th Street. The original section of the facility is a one-story framed and weatherboarded T-plan that has been moved twice since it was constructed in 1903, and has been heavily altered, clearly more than once. Set on a new foundation, it has a four-bay long facade with new nine-over-nine sash, and a new brick chimney built onto the gable end. The entrance to this structure is set into the west side of the front-facing gable. It is a new doorway with imitation colonial-classical detailing. Aluminum siding has also been added. The only authentic decorative elements are the cornice with returns on the gable-end walls, and a carved sunburst pattern set into the wall above the windows in the front-facing gable. This original library building has become an appendage to a modern hipped-room library structure built to the east.

The original section of this library was built in 1903 on Main Street to house the first bank of Calvert County. In 1913, it was moved to another site. In 1921, it became Prince Frederick's first high school. In 1959, it became the location of the first publicly supported library. In 1961, the building was moved to this site on 4th Street. It has since become the west wing of a more extensive public library facility. It is known as the Duke Room after Judge William W. Duke, who founded the first local library.



CAPSULE SUMMARY - WU/KEHOE BARN (CT-1061)

The Wu barn is a 24 x 40 foot structure oriented east-west and located on a lot in the Willows subdivision in the Chesapeake Beach Post Office zone. The town was previously named 'Willows'. The cross-axial plan barn has hewn and pit sawn timbers and fully mature machine cut nails. Sixteen foot wide sheds are located on the south and east sides. Hurricane Hazel is said to have caused extensive damage to the barn's roof which, while still intact, is approximately four feet out of plumb and is bowed like the hull of a ship. The barn has served a number of purposes supplemental to the associated housing development, including furniture and equipment storage and animal stabling. It is presently leased to a local tobacco farmer and is still used to cure tobacco.

7. DESCRIPTION CT-1061

The Wu barn is located in the Willows subdivision on Chavez Ln. The area around it is almost completely developed. The person contacting us regarding the barn is a resident of the area. It is leased by an absentee landlord to one Mr. Lindsay Reid. The axis of the barn is east-west. It is situated on a slight hill behind which lies a relatively flat plain. The cross-axial forty by twenty-four foot barn has hewn and pit sawn timbers, and fully mature machine-cut nails. There are two sixteen foot wide sheds, one on the east and one on the south. The barn suffered extreme roof damage during Hurricane Hazel, and the roof is now four feet out of plumb.

The barn is divided into four eight foot bays on the south side. The central bay has been enlarged on the north side in order to accommodate vehicle entry. Doors are located on the north and south walls of the barn, and there are pintel holes in the east side indicating an original door location. Double doors are also centered along both the south and east shed walls. The barn contains ten rooms.

Concrete block piers support the heavy timber frame on continuous sills. The large timbers are hewn and pit sawn. The posts are joined via mortise and tenon with trunnel joints. Fully mature machine-cut nails are visible. Plain vertical wall siding with minimal ventilation covers the south and east interior walls of the barn. This siding is attached with fully mature machine cut nails. The original wooden shingle roof has been replaced by metal except along the north side where the shingle roof is still in place. The roof rafters are on four foot centers and rest on a flat false plate. The barn has no visible windbraces and four collars. The roof is four feet out of plumb due to storm damage. Unpeeled log tier poles separated by forty-two inches vertical distance are still used to hang tobacco. These poles are supported on peeled log poles that run down the central axis.

There are sixteen foot wide sheds with earth-fast posts on both the south and east sides. These sheds are divided into eight foot bays. There are no nails visible on the barn rafters below their junction with the shed rafters, so it seems probable that both sheds are contemporary with the barn construction. However, the early siding and doorway evidence on these south and east sides, and the lack of ability to safely inspect these rafters, calls this interpretation into question. Nevertheless, these sheds are built of early timbers including hewn nailing rails and siding with cut nails covers their exterior so they are undoubtedly early. There is no evidence of any separation or siding in the area between the two sheds, so they must have been built at the same time. Shingle nailers are in place underneath the metal roof.



8. SIGNIFICANCE CT-1061

This barn is significant as one of the group of nineteenth-century forty by twenty-four foot barns found by this survey. The construction techniques and materials are all typical of tobacco barns built during this period.

This barn also yields information regarding agricultural history in Southern Maryland. In February 1990, a tobacco barn survey was initiated in order to study the tobacco barns of Calvert County. Until fairly recently, tobacco was the most important farm crop of the county. More acreage was devoted to its cultivation than for both of the next most extensive farm products (corn and wheat). The barns and stripping houses related to this "Tobacco Culture" are widely recognized as the most common element on the rural landscape. These structures are also the most threatened, as the market for tobacco declines. They seem to have, at present, only limited capabilities for re-use. Many barns and stripping houses now stand empty. The purpose of this survey has been to gather information and document a wide sample of these structures before they disappear from the landscape.



The changes this barn has undergone are the possible addition of the sheds (both of which were constructed at the same time), the replacement of the shingle roof by metal, and the change in the bay system on the north side in order to allow for vehicle access. The barn was hit by a severe storm (Hazel), and the roof was struck so that it is now four feet out of plumb. The barn is currently leased by a local tobacco farmer and is still used to cure tobacco.
