Present on the 1919 Calvert County tax assessment, and then owned by J. H. Siner, 4107 2nd Street is a 1 1/2 story, gable-front shotgun house. The shotgun house is a common building type in North Beach, since its narrow front and extended length maximizes lot usage. This house is nonetheless interesting because around mid-century the frame structure was veneered in brick. Two porches are present on the house, with the shed-roof porch projecting from the house's west wall being an addition constructed before 1930.

4107 2nd Street faces sits back from the road on an overgrown lot. This dwelling is a south-facing, 1 ½-story, gable-front dwelling and is a variation of the building type known as a shotgun house. Exposed rafter ends and narrow verge boards accent the roofline. This house features a frame structural system, but at some point, probably around mid-century, all exterior walls were encased with brick veneer. The basic rectangular plan of this structure is supplemented by two porches and a rear shed-roof addition. The building is supported by a pier foundation system.

The front, hipped-roof porch features vertical, beaded board siding in the lower section and wire screen in the upper part. The porch door is centrally placed. A shed-roof porch projects from the house's west wall. Its lower, vertical board siding matches that of the front porch. This west porch is not original, but according to Sanborn maps, was in place by 1930. Both porches are historic but show evidence of being rebuilt.

Windows are typically two-over-two, double-hung sash types, including that placed in the upper section of the front gable. The pair of casement windows located in the second story of the east elevation deviate from this typical window pattern. An exterior fireplace is located on the east side. It is sheathed with the same brick veneer used on other exterior walls.

This building is important for its association with the architectural development of the early-20th century summer colony and resort community of North Beach, Maryland. Please refer to the continuation sheets for an historical sketch of the town.

41⁰² 2nd Street is an interesting example of a shotgun house. This modest building type is one of the more common found in North Beach. Its narrow front and extended length maximizes lot usage. At an unknown date brick veneer was applied to exterior walls. This upgrade of exterior finish is also seen at 8925 Dayton Avenue.

4107 appears in the town's 1919 tax assessment. In that year, the property is owned by J.H. Siner and improvements are valued at \$250. In 1925 the owner is Joseph Casimano and improvements are assessed at \$350. By 1935 both the property and the improvements each had a value of \$400. At that time the owner was Frank and Elsie Peninesi.

Section 8: History and Significance

North Beach is a fair to good example of an early 20th century summer resort colony and is a Maryland example of a national trend in community development initiated by the Industrial Revolution. Communities such as North Beach were a result of the growing middle class, mobility and consumerism resulting from the industrial economy that dominated the period. Dozens of beach resorts developed around the Chesapeake Bay in the years between the end of the Civil War and the Great Depression. Some, such as Gibson Island, catered to a rich, white, gentile clientele, while Highland Beach is an example of an African-American summer colony. North Beach was in the middle of the social spectrum. While deed restrictions excluded blacks, Jews were well represented in early North Beach. Excepting this major exclusion, by the standards of the day, North Beach was a heterogeneous middle-class summer community.

North Beach was platted in 1900 (revised in 1908) and incorporated in 1910. The town was developed by a group of principally Washington-based businessmen with ties to railroad, labor and banking. Conceived as a summer residential community and resort, the town was laid out according to a standard grid. In addition to houses, the town featured a variety of tourist and recreation-oriented businesses including theaters, restaurants, dance halls, bingo parlors, amusement arcades, and night clubs--including several gay clubs.

Most surviving historic buildings were constructed in the 1920s and 1930s, and include a good collection of early-20th century vernacular buildings. Represented building types include bungalows, shotguns, American Four Square and gable-front cottages. Most commercial buildings are either destroyed or extremely altered. Many of the town's historic structures were altered in the years immediately following World War II. In the post-war years North Beach completed a transformation begun in the 1930s, from a resort and summer colony to a permanent suburban community.


