The Johnsville M. E. Church is located on the north side of Johnsville Road in southeast Carroll County about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile northwest of Eldersburg. The church is set on a slight slope down to the north, with a cemetery north of the building. It has a rubble stone foundation, asbestos shingle siding with corner boards covering German siding, and a gable roof with asphalt shingles, new aluminum soffits, and a north-south ridge. The building is one bay by four bays, and is one story tall. There is a new stucco addition on the south and east sides of the church. There are no openings in the gable end of the original structure on the south elevation. At the southeast corner of the original building, rising above the later addition that surrounds it, is an open bell tower with four square wood corner posts, an ogee cornice moulding, and a hip roof with asphalt shingles. The southwest corner of the south elevation foundation has a marble datestone with "Johnsville M. E. Church 1920". The new wing on the east elevation has four re-used $\frac{4}{4}$ sash with blue glass. The north elevation has two $\frac{2}{2}$ sash in the foundation, with no other openings. The west elevation has four $\frac{4}{4}$ sash with blue glass and plain wood surrounds in the upper story. The foundation has one $\frac{2}{2}$ sash in the north bay and a four-light sash between the south and south-central bays.

The interior has three-inch wide pine flooring running north-south. The walls are panelled. The gabled ceiling is plastered and is flat at the peak, following the tie beams, most likely. The whole east wall has been opened up into the new addition. The old south wall has new flush wood doors, but the gable end has an oculus with a round center light surrounded by twelve lights, all with blue glass. This oculus is only visible from the interior now. The church has a center aisle. The pews have a roundel on the end at the top, and at the end of the arm rest. There is a raised shield below. There is a raised dais on the north end that is new and has new furniture, except for several old walnut chairs with foliate carving on the top rails and red velvet seats and backs.




