The Dairy Barn is a three story building formed in a T shape. The first floor is constructed of stucco over cast concrete and the second and third floors are covered with diamond shaped shingles. A bellcast gambrel roof covers the entire barn. The northern portion of the building measures eleven bays long and three bays deep while the T projection is fourteen bays long and five bays deep.

Located on the east side of Fourth Street, the Dairy Barn lies across the street from the Horse Barn. Built within two years of each other, the Dairy Barn and the Horse Barn display similar features. The main distinction between the two buildings focuses on the size and shape of the Dairy Barn. The three story Dairy Barn is a much larger building shaped in a T configuration. The northern portion of the barn measures eleven bays long and three bays deep while the T projection off the south wall runs fourteen bays long and five bays deep. The barn displays a mixture of construction materials: the first floor exhibits stucco walls over cast concrete while the second and third floors are covered by diamond-shaped shingles. A bellcast gambrel roof covers both sections of the barn.

The following features repeat throughout the building. A cement string course runs just below the first floor windows. The recessed windows open into the barn and are secured by a chain. Cement forms the jack arch lintel and the sills are constructed of wood. The diamond shaped shingles clad the wall above the first floor. Shed dormers line the bellcast gambrel roof. The windows are paired with wooden sills and single sashes. The crest of the roof line on both sections of the barn are lined with cupolas. The cupolas are rectangular in shape and display gambrel roofs and louvered openings. Lightening rods attach to the roofs of the cupolas.

The east and west gambrel ends exhibit return eaves and plain projecting verges. The windows on the gambrel ends are Palladian with louvered faces. The surrounds of the windows are wooden. The gambrel ends also display a third floor, barn door. The double wooden door is located below the peak of the roof. The roof overhang shelters the door. The overhang itself is supported by brackets.

The southern wall of the T projection does not end in a gambrel. The corners of the building are embellished by two silos constructed of stucco over cast concrete. The silos rise the three stories of the barn and are capped by a bellcast tower roof. On the southern portion of the silo roofs, there is a gabled dormer. The roof of the dormer mimics the large overhang of the other roof. This southern wall between the two silos does not reveal any Palladian windows but instead a wooden door occupies the central bay on each floor.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

Springfield State Hospital maintained a large herd of cows for the production of milk and beef. To adequately house these animals, the hospital constructed a new Dairy Barn in 1922. The dairy operation at the hospital was one of the largest components of the farm production. The construction of a large dairy barn emphasized the importance of this farm component and increased the available space to house the Holstein cows.

The architectural elements of the Dairy Barn are similar to those of the Horse Barn and possess a slight degree of uncommonness. The construction materials of stucco and concrete are not a standard choice for barn construction in the Carroll County area. Both the construction materials and the use of Palladian windows reflect the time in which the barn was built. The use of classical features appear throughout the buildings at Springfield and the Dairy Barn is no exception.
