The Paint Shop is a one story building which lies just north of the Carpenter Shop in the industrial section of the hospital. Constructed of cement blocks, the Paint Shop measures nine bays long and three bays deep. A flat roof covers the building. The structure is supported by a stone foundation which incorporates a full basement level. The main facade faces north.

The fenestration pattern remains simple. The ground level openings on the east and west walls exhibit a 3/3 double-hung sash and a wooden sill and surround. The foundation displays a smooth wall surface. A cement string course divides the foundation from the first floor. Above the string course, the cement is fashioned into bricks with rough faces. The first floor windows repeat the 3/3 sash. A small, cement cornice forms above the first floor and connects to the flat roof.

The ground level openings on the north wall have been altered slightly. The three bays of the wall are divided into two single doors and one large stable door. Cement pilasters punctuate the wall. The two individual doors are wooden, detailed by a cement lintel and row of header bricks above the cement providing a vertical joint lintel. The stable doors are constructed of vertical bead board braced by criss-cross reinforcements. All the doors show stone sills. The other elements of the facade repeat above the doors like the string course and the window treatment.

An one story addition provides the biggest change on the eastern wall. Located on the southern half of the east wall, the addition attaches just below the string course and measures four bays long and two bays deep. Constructed of cinder block, the addition displays a shed roof above a boxed cornice. The windows exhibit brick sills, cement vertical joint lintels, and a single sash of twenty-one panes.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

The Paint Shop was constructed as the Cannery Storage Building in 1940. The function of the structure explains its close proximity to the Cannery Building. An appropriation of \$5000 was requested to build the food storage Warehouse in 1939. The basement of the building was slated for housing the mechanical shop. Springfield supervised the construction of the building so that costs could be kept to a minimum.

The architecture of the building closely resembles the Cannery Building. Several buildings throughout the industrial section of the hospital utilized the cement blocks as the construction material for one story buildings. Because of this construction material, the function of the building is easily distinguished from the patient care buildings. The architectural embellishments are limited on the Paint Shop but the lack of detail reflects the fact that Springfield personnel constructed the building.

The construction date of 1940 indicates the continuing commitment of Springfield State Hospital to its farm production. The Cannery Storage Building provided additional space for the canned products produced in the Cannery. The farm operation increased the efficiency of the hospital.
