

ROOP HOUSE

224 EAST MAIN STREET

Probably of very early origin (land records reveal that some structure was built on this lot about the time of the Revolution), this house had assumed its present day character by the mid-nineteenth century; a gable-roofed two and a half story 3-bay-by-2-bay box with a rear ell opening, by a two-story porch, to the southeast. The entrance door, the eastern ground floor bay, has 8 panels and a narrow transom beneath a modestly bracketed simple cornice. The other five, regularly-placed principal facade bays are 2/2 double-hung sash windows with wooden sills, the simplest of enframements, and flanking black louvered shutters. Number 224 is important in Westminster's streetscape as it serves (with the larger scale no. 226 East Main Street) to illustrate how successfully the typical Pennsylvania small-town house, normally built in brick, can be rendered in frame and clapboard as well.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Similar to its immediate eastern neighbor, but of smaller scale, is number 224 East Main Street (Maryland Route 32) Westminster. In fact, while 226 East Main could conceivably appear anywhere along the East Coast, number 224 is a wooden relative of the usually brick "central Pennsylvania small-town house" that occasionally appears in Westminster.

Possibly of very early origin, the house had assumed its present character by the Mid-nineteenth century - a gable roofed 2 1/2 story, 3 bay by 2 bay cube with a rear ell, opening to the southeast. The entrance door, the eastern ground floor bay, has eight panels and a narrow transom beneath a modestly bracketed simple cornice. The other five regularly placed north facade bays are 2/2 double-hung sash windows, with white wooden sills, the simplest of enframements, and flanking black louvered shutters. All this sits between a low field-stone foundation and simply corniced eaves. A corbelled brick chimney, flush with the west wall, pierces the black tin roof. Otherwise, there are 2 vertically aligned 2/2 windows (1 per floor) in the southern portion of the west wall, and, in the ell, 2 regularly placed 6/6 windows. The east front has 2/2 windows in the Main Street section which match those on the west side; a 6-light window serves the attic. The once open 2-tiered porch, which ran the length of the ell, has been enclosed (in glass to the north, in screen to the south and in clapboard on the second floor) and is irregularly dotted with irregularly styled windows. A large corbelled brick chimney rests about 20 feet from the southern end of the ell, at the peak of the black tin covered gable roof. A very large, stepped, corbell-capped exterior chimney fills the western half of its ell's south front. To its east on the second floor is a 6/6 window, and a modern glass and aluminum storm door, which is directly approached by a single flight of red wooden steps. "About 15 years ago," according to a present tenant a small shed roofed shed was added to this end.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Number 224 East Main Street is significant as a reminder of the often slow steps taken by the pioneers, steps leading away for their earliest primitive shelters. It is a truism that the settlers would, as quickly as possible, exchange their log houses for ones of more substantialness; this building reminds us that often this exchange would result in a building not too different in plan and size. This small size may be understandable if we recall that the place has always been of secondary importance - in earliest times the land was sold as part of a larger deal (Frederick County Land Records Book BD, page 185, also WR 32/22, JS 8/118, dated, respectively, 1775, 1809, and 1819). When John Fisher (see 222, 226 East Main Street) took title, deed JS 8/118, January 2, 1819, the land was probably unimproved. Fisher, a prominent local landholder, may have built the existing dwelling as rental property before his death in 1858. For the next 70 years the house passed, by way of the Orphans' Court, through the Roop family. A.V.Z. Quin took title in 1935 (163/487); her daughter, the present owner, purchased the lot from the estate on August 5, 1959, deed 309/42. Thus, even to the present day, number 224 has always been a small piece of a large transaction (in 309/42, 5 lots changed hands).

It is also a "small piece" of a larger architectural style - that we have called the Pennsylvania small-town house, the "essentially decent building" (see 270-272 East Main Street). Number 224 shows that while normally of brick, the style can be successfully rendered in wood as well.
