The Salem M.E. Church congregation was formed in 1854 and its first sanctuary was a weatherboard structure located in the general vicinity of the existing building. The present church was built in 1879. W.H. Bell of Westminster provided the brick, and the masonry work was done by John Ridinger and his brother. Timber was donated by Henrietta Frizzell, and carpenter work done by Joshua Ditman. The land was not deeded to the church until 1892, and the cemetery added in 1903. A fence was added around the cemetery in 1912. Notable changes were made to the building in 1913. Where there had originally been one aisle, some of the long benches were cut in half and placed on both sides, with long benches in the center, thus creating two aisles. This is unique since most churches in Carroll County by the early twentieth century (and many for years before) were being built with a single entrance and aisle, instead of the more traditional double entrance and aisle plan. The stained glass windows were bought from Gitters of Baltimore City and installed at this time. A new church hall was added to the back of the sanctuary in 1979.

**Summary:** Salem M.E. Church is located on the northwest side of Salem Bottom Road at the intersection of Bear Branch Road, and just south of Muller Road in central Carroll County. It is about 3½ miles south of Warfieldsburg and 3 miles northeast of Winfield. The church is a three-bay by four-bay, one-story structure with a rubble stone foundation, 6-1 common bond brick walls, and a gable roof with diamond pattern shingles and a ridge that runs north-south. The building faces south toward Salem Bottom Road. The central entrance has double doors with two panels each, and the top panels have semi-circular arches. There is a lanceolate transom with stained glass above the door. Flanking the door on each side is a stained glass lancet window. There is a large oculus in the gable end, of stained and etched glass. A marble stone in the southwest corner of this elevation is carved "Salem M.E. Church Rebuilt A.D. 1879." The east and west elevations each have four stained glass lancet windows and a cornice with three courses of corbelled bricks below a course of corbelled dog-tooth brick. The stained glass windows are all square-headed on the interior, despite being lancets on the exterior. There is a cemetery across the road, south of the church, at the northeast corner of Salem Bottom and Bear Branch Roads.

Salem M.E. Church is located on the northwest side of Salem Bottom Road at the intersection of Bear Branch Road, and just south of Muller Road in central Carroll County. It is about 3½ miles south of Warfieldsburg and 3 miles northeast of Winfield. The church is a three-bay by four-bay, one-story structure with a rubble stone foundation, 6-1 common bond brick walls, and a gable roof with diamond pattern shingles and a ridge that runs north-south. The building faces south toward Salem Bottom Road. The central entrance has double doors with two panels each, and the top panels have semi-circular arches. The panels are created with applied bolection mouldings, and the door frames have ogee mouldings. There is a lanceolate transom with stained glass above the door, and a "V" mullion that divides it into three lights, two of which are smaller lancets. The center light is dated "1910". The door sill is marble. Flanking the door on each side is a stained glass lancet window. There is a large oculus in the gable end, of stained and etched glass, with muntins in a four-point star pattern. The raking eave is of corbelled brick. A marble stone in the southwest corner of this elevation is carved "Salem M.E. Church Rebuilt A.D. 1879." The east and west elevations each have four stained glass lancet windows and a cornice with three courses of corbelled bricks below a course of corbelled dog-tooth brick. The north elevation has a later addition, and no openings in the gable end above it.

The church is a one-room sanctuary with the altar and pulpit placed on a raised dais on the north end and enclosed by an altar rail on three sides. The simple balusters of the rail are turned and the wood appears to be walnut. The pulpit is further raised on

a panelled wood podium. The pulpit has a single sunken panel on the east, west, and south faces. Behind the pulpit is an upholstered couch, and in front of it two matching chairs. They all are Renaissance Revival in style and appear to be walnut, as well. The north wall has a painted lancet, and inside it is the bible painted inside a circle at the top. Below this are two semi-circular-arched painted tablets, probably meant to represent the ten commandments. West of the painting is a new door into the north addition, which was added in 1979. The east, west, and south walls are now covered in paneling. The floor is tongue-and-groove oak that runs east-west, and there is a new drop ceiling.

The interior of the south doors has sunken panels with ogee panel moulds, and a cast iron box lock with porcelain knob attached to the inside face. The surround is basically plain, with the inner half bevelled in toward the door. The stained glass windows are all square-headed on the interior, despite being lancets on the exterior. The glass has a lancet pattern, with green glass in the spandrels. The north and south-central bay windows have a green outer margin, a brown inner margin, and a rose field, while the north central and south bay windows have a purple outer margin, a green inner margin, and a yellow field. They all have a circular medallion set above the center, with a symbol painted inside it. They also have a memorial tablet in the bottom. The window surrounds are plain. Both the east and west walls have a buttress in the center. The pews are arranged with three columns and two aisles. At the south end, the side pews are longer, and there are no center pews, thus bringing the two aisles together into a vestibule at the central doors. The pews are grained, and the ends are jigsawn boards with a curved arm rest and an inverted teardrop cutout at the top. There is a cemetery across the road, south of the church, at the northeast corner of Salem Bottom and Bear Branch Roads.

its first catalogue not issued until two years later, the date of this installation is not known, and the ceiling is now hidden, if it survives, by a recent drop ceiling. Building materials were hauled by a number of local farmers, as was the custom. The old church building was moved to Winfield, where a black congregation used it as a church and school.

The land was not deeded to the church until 1892, and the cemetery added in 1903. A fence was added around the cemetery in 1912. Notable changes were made to the building in 1913. Where there had originally been one aisle, some of the long benches were cut in half and placed on both sides, with long benches in the center, thus creating two aisles. This is unique since most churches in Carroll County by the early twentieth century (and many for years before) were being built with a single entrance and aisle, instead of the more traditional double entrance and aisle plan. The stained glass windows were bought from Gitters of Baltimore City and installed at this time, and carpeting, from the Babylon and Lippy store in Westminster, was laid over the entire floor by Mr. Staub. The church was also painted, and when the work was completed, a dedication service was held. The following year a wood frame church hall was constructed, but this building no longer survives.

The carpeting laid in 1913 was taken up in 1941, and the best pieces used to cover the aisles and chancel. The rest of the floor was painted, as were the walls. The coal oil lamps were removed from the large hanging chandeliers and the church was electrified. A new floor was laid in the church in 1952, and new carpet added to the aisles and chancel. The church was painted, and was painted inside and out again in 1957. Cleaning and painting was required again in 1961 due to smoke damage from the oil burner. A new church hall was added to the back of the sanctuary in 1979. Despite panelling and a drop ceiling added to the interior, and an addition on the rear, Salem M.E. Church retains a great deal of integrity, both to the building and furnishings, and well illustrates a typical Carroll County church of the late nineteenth century.





Martenet Map, 1862


