The Samuel Shriner Farm, located south of Taneytown in rural Carroll County, MD, and consisting of a small farm complex, is not considered eligible for individual listing on the National Register of Historic Places. The property is outside of a potential Taneytown Historic District; however, along with other farmsteads in the vicinity, the property could contribute to a potential rural historic district. At this point, no examination of the area for rural historic district designation has taken place.

The property features a brick-clad log farmhouse, an early 20th-century gambrel roofed barn, and early 20th-century concrete block milkhouse, a privy, a machinery shed and a mid-20th-century equipment shed. The dwelling is a three-bay structure, covered with a gable roof and clad with a brick veneer. The brick veneer, in addition to an enclosed front room extending the width of the facade completely detract from the historic character of the building. Similarly, a frame gambrel-roofed barn has been significantly altered with a concrete block foundation. The other domestic and agricultural buildings are not architecturally notable. The property lacks the architectural distinctiveness and integrity necessary to qualify it for listing on the National Register.

The Samuel Shriner Farm consists of a brick-cased log farmhouse, an early twentieth-century frame and concrete block gambrel roof barn, an early twentieth-century concrete block milkhouse, a privy, a machinery shed, and a modern equipment shed. The farmhouse is a three-bay (with two front doors), double-pile log structure cased with brick. A two-story frame addition is attached to the rear of the structure. The barn features a pedimented louvered ventilator at the peak of the southwest elevation, as well as louvered ventilators with gothic arches. The Samuel Shriner Farm does not appear to be eligible for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places due to the remodeling of the house. The brick on the exterior of the house has been harshly cleaned, the window sash has been replaced with modern sash, one of the doors on the facade has been blocked-up with concrete block, the front porch has been remodeled, and a modern portico has been added to the southeast elevation. The remodeling has resulted in the loss of the integrity of design, materials, and workmanship.

The Samuel Shriner Farm consists of a brick-cased log farmhouse, an early twentieth-century frame and concrete block gambrel roof barn, an early twentieth-century concrete block milkhouse, a privy, a machinery shed, and a modern twentieth-century equipment shed. The farm buildings stand at the end of a 600 foot lane.

The farmhouse consists of a three-bay (with two front doors), double-pile, log house cased with brick which has been harshly cleaned. The window sash in the building has been replaced with modern sash (except for the center second-story window on the facade). One of the two doors on the facade has been blocked-up with concrete block. A porch, which runs the length of the facade, has been enclosed to create a sunroom. A two-story frame addition was constructed to the rear of the house, and features a modern portico on the southeast elevation.

To the southeast of the house stands a gambrel-roof frame barn standing on a concrete block foundation. The barn features a pedimented louvered ventilator at the peak of the southwest elevation, as well as louvered ventilators with gothic arches. To the southwest of the barn stands a concrete block milkhouse with a gable roof.

Behind the house (to the northeast) are three additional outbuildings: a modern equipment building; a three-bay, frame machinery shed; and a frame privy.

Although the farmhouse is a characteristic vernacular type for the region, the remodeling of the building has created a loss of integrity.

The Samuel Shriner Farm is part of the land grant, "Resurvey on Brother's Agreement." The farmhouse appears on the 1862 map of Carroll County as the property of Frank Stultz, who according to county records, did not own the property (Simon J. Martenet, "Martenet's Map of Carroll County" Baltimore: Simon J. Martenet, 1862); Stultz may have been a tenant on the farm.

S. Shriner appears as the owner of a house at this location on the 1877 map (Illustrated Map of Carroll County (Philadelphia: Lake, Griffing & Stevenson, 1877)). Shriner had purchased the land, part of a 301 acre tract, from the Fredericktown Savings Institution in 1847 (Carroll County Land Record Book 7: 1993). The Fredericktown Savings Institution had acquired the land from John H. and Mary J. Crump in 1834 (Frederick County Land Record Book 50: 81). Samuel Shriner's executor sold 60 acres of the farm (including the land associated with this dwelling) to David Trimmer in 1892 (CCLRB 75: 409). The farm was trimmed down to 38 1/4 acre and 17 square perches in 1919 (CCLRB 134: 35). The present owner acquired the property in 1981 (CCLRB 789: 557).




