Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The Brillhart/Lippy Farm complex is comprised of a brick turn-of-the-century house, two barns, several sheds, and a brick summer house/springhouse.

House (1880-1910)

The main block is 2-1/2 stories, four bays by three bays with an asphalt shingle, hipped roof with gabled east dormer and a central brick chimney. A two story, two bay oriel on the southeast corner is capped by a gable dormer with a one-over-one window. Fenestration is regular with one-over-one wood, double-hung sash on all elevations. A wraparound porch with wrought iron posts on block piers and block balustrade extends across the south elevation and principal [east] facade.

The massing, multiple gables, projecting bay, and stepped-back front facade of the house reflect popular Queen Anne-style motifs at the turn of the century. Its generally boxy appearance also reflects the coming popularity of the foursquare form at the century's turn. The large wraparound porch further contributes to the imposing character of the dwelling.

Summer House/ Springhouse (1880-1900)

Located south of the main house is a 1-1/2 story brick summer house with a vaulted arch springhouse in the lower level. Built into a slight bank, the structure is two bays by one bay with 9 lite windows on all elevations and a metal gable roof parallel to the road.

Barn (1880-1910)

The 2-1/2 story frame with fieldstone foundation barn is eight bays by three bays on a fieldstone foundation. The metal gable roof is perpendicular to the road and there are four lightening rods evenly spaced across its ridge line. Originally the forebay was unsupported, however, a brick extension was built on the southeast bay and a cinder block enclosure on the southwest bay. The foldyard is oriented towards the south and partially enclosed by a block wall. A deteriorated shed is affixed to the west elevation. The fenestration consists of six wood ventilators across the south elevation. There are two hay doors in the center bays of the south elevation.

Barn (1880-1910)

A 1-1/2 story frame on fieldstone English barn with metal sheet siding is located east of the main house on the east side of Hanover Pike. The metal gable roof is parallel to the road. The structure is three bays by two bays.

Outbuildings (1880-present)

An open, frame tractor shed is located southeast of the foldyard. A large, frame chicken house with fieldstone foundation and metal gable roof is east of the barn. A frame shed with metal roof is located west of the barn and used for storage while a larger, frame outbuilding far to the east of the barn is used for equipment storage.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

The Lippy Farm is an unremarkable example of a turn-of-the-century farmstead. While the farm is still agriculturally intact, the main house, barn, and outbuildings are a common architectural style found within the project area. The only notable structure is the summer house/springhouse which is unusual because of its vaulted arch springhouse and brick construction.

Evaluation:

Constructed circa 1880-1910, the Lippy Farm is not eligible for the National Register. The property is not eligible under Criterion A; no significant events historically or agriculturally have been determined to be associated with the property. The property is not eligible under Criterion B; no persons significant in local, state or national history have been determined to have been associated with the property. The property is not eligible under Criterion C; the property is not a significant example of its type, design or manner of construction. There are more significant examples of similar turn-of-the-century properties within the project area.


