Summary:

The 1862 map of Carroll County identified this farm as that of Amen Miller. As the result of an Equity court case, the farm was offered for sale in 1867. At that time it was "... improved with a comfortable Two Story Log Dwelling House, Log Barn, Wagon Shed, Corn House, Hog House, Spring House ...." The 123 1/4 acre farm was purchased by John Diehl and Samuel Diehl, who were apparently brothers living separate adjoining farms. They probably purchased the farm in order to add additional land to their own, as Samuel soon sold his right to 38 1/4 acres to John. This is input suggested by the absence of the farm on the 1877 atlas. John later sold this land to Joseph Zepp, then sold his right to the remaining 85 acres to Samuel in 1882. Samuel immediately sold this tract to Mary Ann Smith, the widow of Richard Smith. A week after buying the 85 acres, Mary Ann Smith wrote her will. In it, she left the farm to her son, Henry Smith, for life, but she assigned William T. Smith to act as trustee for Henry. After Henry's death, the farm was to pass to his wife, Sallie A. [Shueey] Smith, and their children. This is an unusual arrangement. Clearly, Mary Ann Smith wanted to ensure that her grandchildren were provided for, and apparently she could not trust her son to do this after her death.

The Sally A. Smith Farm is located at 2224 Bowersox Road approximately 2 ½ miles southeast of the town of New Windsor in west central Carroll County, Maryland. The farm is set on the west side of the road, well off of the road, and is set on a hillside that slopes up to the northwest and down to the southeast to a small stream. On the opposite side of the stream the ground slopes up to the southeast. The buildings are generally set in the middle of the hillside. The farm complex consists of a frame house; a frame bank barn; a combination summer kitchen and spring house of frame; a smokehouse and two sheds.

The house is banked into the hill on the northwest and faces southeast. It is a 2 story three bay by two bay frame structure with a 2 story three bay by two bay frame addition on the rear or northwest. The building has a rubble-stone foundation; aluminum siding and a standing seam metal roof with a northeast to southwest ridge. The ell has a northwest to southeast ridge and is set slightly higher than the ridge line of the main block. The southeast elevation has a center entrance with a new doorway. A 1993 photograph of the house shows a front porch that rested on brick piers in this location. It was a one bay one story porch with a hip roof supported by four square posts. There were square balusters above horizontal board rails. The porch has been completely removed. The doorway is flanked by a 1/1 sash on either side, and the second story has three 1/1 sash. These sash are new. There is an interior brick chimney on both the northeast and southwest gable ends. The northeast elevation has a vertical board door in the east bay of the foundation. The first story has two 2/2 sash and the second story also has two 2/2 sash. The gable end has two 1-light sash. The northeast elevation of the wing, which is in the same plane as the gable end of the main block, has a center entrance on the first story with a 1-light transom and a 2/2 sash to each side. There is a shed roof three bay 1 story porch that has standing seam metal, chamfered posts and vertical balusters. The second story has a 2/2 sash in both of the end bays and no opening in the center bay.

There is a cellar under the southeast half of the house and a crawl space under the northwest wing. The first story has mill-sawn joists with cross bracing. There is a large cooking fireplace in the northeast cellar room which has plastered walls and ceiling. The southwest cellar room is unfinished. The first story has a new open stairway in the center. There are identical rooms on each side of the stairway with a central fireplace on each gable end wall that has plain pilaster strips and a plain wide freeze. The walls have modern paneling. The ell room has a fireplace on the northwest elevation with a winder stair in the north corner. The second story has the same plan as the first story but has two rooms in the ell. The ell doors have four panels with double fields. The front section of the house has four panel doors with single fields. The main block attic has sash-sawn rafters that are mitered at the ridge. There is shingle lath where the ell

roof covers the roof of the main block. The ell has circular sawn rafters. An original lunette in the ell southeast gable end was recently removed. It is constructed with wire nails and there is one cut nail that apparently held it into the wall.

About 50 feet southwest of the house is a smokehouse with a rubble-stone foundation and re-used barn siding on it. The southwest gable end has German siding. The gable roof has flat metal and has a northeast to southwest ridge. There is a new door on the southeast elevation set south of center. The building is constructed of v-notch corner logs with stone chinking.

There is a summer kitchen/spring house about 100 feet south of the house. They are two separate structures covered with German siding fastened by wire nails, but they share a common gable roof of corrugated metal with a ridge that runs northeast to southwest. There is an open breezeway or dog trot between the two buildings with openings on the northwest and southeast elevations. The northwest elevation has no openings on the spring house. There is a four panel door with double fields and a window opening to the west of it on the summer kitchen. The northeast elevation has two 1-light casements and a 2/2 double-hung sash in the gable end. The summer kitchen has a rubble-stone foundation and is of two by four construction. It is unfinished on the interior. There is a brick exterior chimney on the southwest end that is collapsed. The spring house has a concrete foundation with circular sawn construction. The roof rafters are also circular sawn and are mitered at the ridge. They are fastened with wire nails. About 4 feet northwest of the building is a rubble-stone wall that parallels it. In the center of this wall lining up with the breezeway is a set of stone stairs.

About 125 feet northeast of the house is a frame bank barn with a four bay that faces southeast. It has rubble-stone on the lower story on three elevations with frame on the southeast elevation. The upper story is also of frame. The barn has a gable roof of standing seam metal with a northeast to southwest ridge. On the southeast elevation, the lower story has a horizontal flush board wall. From south to east, this wall has a door opening that had a Dutch door on strap hinges; a vertical board Dutch door on tapered strap hinges with round ends; a boarded-up opening; a door opening that had a single door on strap hinges; a vertical board door on typical strap hinges; a boarded over low opening; a vertical board Dutch door on machine made strap hinges and a door opening that originally had a Dutch door. The upper story is missing most of its vertical board siding. From south to east are two wood louvered vents over two more vents; paired vertical board doors on butterfly hinges over similar doors on tapered strap hinges; two vents over two vents; a single vertical board door on butterfly hinges and two vents over two vents.

Description

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The southwest elevation on the lower story has two adjustable wood louver vents. The upper story has a grainery door of vertical boards hung on butterfly hinges at the west end corner. Evidence suggests that the upper story had four vents above four vents, but only the two end vents survive. The gable end has a lunette vent with plywood letters below that spell out ORVIL [L] E [R] SMITH [1] 95 [2?]. Below this are two wood vents. On the northwest elevation, the lower story has two adjustable wood louver vents at the north corner. The stone has collapsed at the north corner and along the northwest wall. The upper story has two pair of large wagon doors in the center. These doors have vertical boards and are hung on machine made strap hinges. To the north of these doors are two vents above two vents. The siding here is partially missing and there could have originally been three vents over three vents. To the west of the doors are two vents over two window openings. One of these openings has a single light in an altered 4-light sash. Most of the metal has been removed from the roof on the northwest elevation exposing earlier wood shingles. On the northeast elevation, the lower story has two window openings. The upper story has four vents above four vents. The gable end has a lunette vent and two vents below it.

The southwest end of the barn has a sash-sawn beam set in the wall that contains wood pegs. In the south corner of the wall is a wood box. The wall was originally parged and some of this survives at the top. In the center of each wood vent is a post that pivots to open the vent. The floor joists are hewn on top and bottom inside the barn and on all four sides beneath the forebay. All but one of these joists run the whole width of the barn. The southeast wall is of hewn frame that is morticed and tenoned and pegged. There is one summer beam that runs northeast to southwest. It has a half lap scarf that is pegged and there is a post tenoned underneath of the summer beam at the scarf joint. The northwest stone wall has partially collapsed and the center posts and four bay wall are leaning to the southeast. The northeast end of the barn has a circular sawn summer beam and the joists are circular sawn on top and bottom. There is a large wood box set in the northeast wall. There is a concrete floor with manure trough on the northeast end and a wood beam that has hanging wood stanchions. There is also a concrete feed trough in this end of the barn.

The upper story of the barn is four bays. It has two center threshing floors with a hay mow on each end and a grainery in the west corner. The three bays to the southwest are original and the bay to the northeast was added later. The four original vents have had many members cut out. The posts, braces and girts are all hewn and morticed and tenoned and pegged. The latter posts and four bay framing is all sash sawn. The rafters are sawn and are approximately three by threes that are mitered at the ridge. They support lath and wood shingles. There is a wood hay

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track below the ridge. The northeast bay is circular sawn timber that is morticed and tenoned and pegged. The rafters here appear to be the same as though the roof was replaced when the addition was made. There are center posts beneath the purlins in each hay mow and down braces as well. These rest on a sill set on top of the floor. The original section never had these center posts. The wood louver vents are all fastened with wire nails. There are numerous holes in the roof and floor of the barn which is extremely deteriorated and is scheduled to be demolished.

About 30 feet southeast of the barn is a banked 2 story CMU hog pen with a shed roof of standing seam metal. There are exterior pens on the southeast side of this structure. Contributing resources 4.

Mary Ann Smith died in early 1886. Two years later, Sallie Smith purchased the 38 1/4 acre tract from Joseph Zepp, thus re-uniting the divided farm that had been Amen Millers. None of Miller's buildings seem to survive, except the log smoke house. They had probably been neglected in the period before the Smith's acquired the farm, and likely were replaced by the Smiths over a period of years. The main block of the house probably date to the period c. 1882, as does the barn, most likely. The ell was probably added to the house c. 1895-1905. The other outbuildings probably date to this period too.

Henry Smith died at age 62 of Bright's disease, after a several month's illness, in September 1906. He left eleven children, five of whom were still under the age of twenty-one. The property ended up in Chancery Court in order to have it divided between the heirs, and it was sold to Sallie Smith. This time, the sale description noted that "this property is improved by a two and one-half story frame dwelling, bank barn, wagon shed, dairy, corncrib..." The farm remained in her possession until her death in February 1939, and then was purchased by her (youngest) son Orville R. Smith. He retained it until 1965. The farm has now been reduced to less than 17 acres, and is no longer in the family.


