Summary:

Lutheran Church mission work in the Hampstead area began in 1869, and the pastor of the Beckleysville charge began preaching in the Red Men's Hall in 1873. With the departure of the pastor, there was a lull in activity, but efforts resumed in 1879 and St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church was organized in November of that year. Andrew Shaffer gave the land for the construction of a church building, and plans were begun in 1881. The brick sanctuary was completed in 1883. In 1886, the Reverend Samuel J. Derr, a recent graduate of the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, answered the call of St. Mark's. Two years later, at age 32, he married Andrew Shaffer's daughter, Elizabeth A. (E. Aggie). Elizabeth Shaffer Stansbury was a 30 year old widow. She in turn gave the church land on which to build a parsonage, next to the church, and the brick structure was completed in 1889. Rev. Derr served as pastor until 1901, and then seems to have gone into the pharmaceutical business, acquiring stock in trade from Dr. Richard Wells by 1902, and other stock in drugs by 1908.

St. Marks Evangelical Lutheran Church is located on the east side of Main Street in Hampstead in northeastern Carroll County, Maryland and faces west toward the road. It is a 1 story three bay by four bay structure with rock faced ashlar walls and gib surrounds on the windows and doors. It has a gable roof of slate with an east/west ridge. The west elevation has a projecting 1 story one bay center porch that has a gable roof of slate with an east/west ridge. The porch has paired doors with eight panels each and a Tudor arch transom that is now blocked off. The north and south elevations of the porch have stained glass lancet windows. The north and south bays of the west elevation of the church also have stained glass lancet windows, and the gable end has a stained glass rose window. There is a bell tower on the west gable end. It is octagonal and has a copper spire. In the southeast corner are two date stones; one marked "1883" and the other "St. Marks Lutheran Church 1940".

On the south elevation there are three buttresses. The west/west center and east center bays each have a stained glass lancet window. The east bay has paired small stained glass lancet windows. The north elevation has an addition made of the same stone work and dated 1992. There is an addition on the east elevation that projects to the south one bay. This addition is of 7 to 1 common bond brick. The west elevation has a new door in a reduced opening. Above the doorway is a stone marked "St. Marks Sunday School 1938". This addition is four bays deep. The south elevation from west to east has a buttress of 6/6 sash; another buttress two 6/6 sash; another buttress and an exterior brick chimney. There is a bracketed cornice that steps down over the two center buttresses. There are two brick additions to the east of this one of more recent date. The east elevation of the church has a brick gable end with a louver in it. The north elevation of these additions is all of brick and was built in at least three stages.

The lower story of the church building has knotty pine paneling and a drop ceiling. The sanctuary north wall has been opened up for expansion. The south wall has an early stained glass. There is a run of plaster cornice on the both the north and south elevations. The wood board ceiling runs east/west following the profile of the rafters and collar beams. The apse has three Tudor arches; the center arch being wider and taller. The arches are supported by two square columns with covetto moldings at the top. The wood pews have square paneled ends with a flower carved in each end.

The parish house which was originally built as a parsonage is divided into a side passage in the northwest corner with rooms to the southwest; southeast and northeast. The passage has a straight run stairway along the north wall. The stair has a closed stringer that is reeded. It has a square newel post with reeding and a pine stylized foliage above and has turned balusters. The southwest room has paneling on the walls and a rebuilt brick fireplace on the north elevation. The east elevation originally had a wide doorway to the southeast room. The southeast room has a

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marbleized slate mantel on the north elevation. It has a semicircular arched opening with a simple keystone. These walls are also paneled. The northeast room is a modern kitchen with a powder room off of the northeast of it that was probably originally a pantry. The east elevation also has an exterior door. There is a built-in cupboard on the south wall to the east. A closet under the front stairway is accessed from this room and the stairs to the cellar are here. Moved to elsewhere, there is a cellar underneath the whole house. The joists are sash sawn and are approximately two by eights with bridging fastened with cut nails. Moved to elsewhere, throughout the house are four paneled doors with symmetrical architrave on the doors and windows that is pulvinated in the center and has bulls-eye corner blocks. Moved to elsewhere, above the cellar stair is a stairway to the second story. The second story plan is similar to the first story, but has three rooms across the east half instead of two, and has a cross passage which runs to the south on the west side of enclosed service stairway from the first story. There is a single room in the southwest corner. The attic stairs are enclosed and are set above the service stairway from the first to second stories. The attic has three finished rooms with plaster walls that follow the profile of the rafters and collar beams. Contributing Resources 1.

The Blank House is located at 1373 Main Street in Hampstead in northeastern Carroll County, Maryland. The house is located on the east side of the road and faces west toward the road. The house is a 2 ½ story three bay by two bay T plan structure with a gable front to the street. It has running bond brick on the west elevation and six to one common bond brick on the remaining elevations. The gable roof has asphalt shingles and an east/west ridge on the western section with a north/south ridge on the eastern or rear T. On the west elevation, the first story has a side passage with a multi-paneled door in the north bay that has side lights of three lights over one panel, and the doorway has a 3-light transom. There are two 1/1 sash to the south. The second story has three 1/1 sash and the gable end has paired 1/1 sash and aluminum siding. There is a 1 story four bay porch that wraps around to the south. It has brick piers and brick walls between the piers. Above the piers are battered fluted square columns that support a hip roof with asphalt shingles.

The south elevation has a 1/1 sash in the west bay of the first and second stories. The west elevation of the south T has a glazed multi-paneled door on the first story and a 1/1 sash on the second story. The south elevation of this T in the east bay has a three sided bay window on the first and second stories with a 1/1 sash on each side of the bay window. The gable end has aluminum siding and three 1-light sash. The north and south sash have rounded top corners. On the north elevation, the west bay has no openings. The west elevation of the north T has a 1/1 sash on both the first and second stories. The north elevation of this T; the east bay originally had two 1/1 sash on both the first and second stories, but the first story east window has been reduced and a new sash put in. The gable end has aluminum siding and paired 1/1 sash. The east

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elevation is three bays. The house is slightly banked with the ground sloping off to the east and the ground has been dug out to get to a doorway in the south bay of the foundation. The door has vertical boards. The first story has a 1/1 sash in the south bay and a door set north of center. The porch is enclosed on the north end. The porch sits on brick piers and is probably original but now has aluminum siding and a 2/2 sash in the enclosure. The shed roof of the porch extends across the whole east elevation but the porch deck only covers the northern two-thirds of this elevation. The second story has two 1/1 sash. The house that the church built for a parsonage was a "T" plan structure, also sometimes called a homestead ell or tri-gabled ell, although the north wing of the "T" is shallower than typical, and thus the porch does not wrap around on the north side. This is a national trend in house design and there is nothing traditional about the house. The house has had a few alterations but remains substantially the way it was built, and has a marbleized slate mantel in one of the first story rooms.

Numerous changes have been made to the church. In 1938, the Parish School building was constructed. In August 1940, the old brick church was demolished and a new building started. The cornerstone was laid on 22 September 1940, and the building was dedicated in April 1941. The building comes from the English parish church tradition re-popularized in the nineteenth century by the ecclesiological movement.


