Description of Property and Eligibility Determination: *(Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo)*
The James M. Bush House is an ell-shaped frame dwelling, formerly part of an agricultural property. It retains two outbuildings. The house exhibits Gothic Revival detailing and massing along with possibly a four-over-four room plan. With little integrity as an agricultural property, and as an example of a ubiquitous house type, with no significant unique historical association, the James M. Bush House does not have the level of architectural or historical importance to warrant listing on the National Register of Historic Places. .

The James M. Bush House is located to the south of Hampstead in a farming community that was affected by the construction of the Baltimore, and Hanover Railroad between 1876 and 1879. In addition to the railroad, which caused the removal of buildings and the truncation of farm properties, the integrity of the area has been further compromised by the construction of a string of industrial and commercial complexes along MD 30 to the north of the dwelling. These were likely built on land severed from the 124 acre property in the 1950's, with the acreage subsequently reduced to ca. one acre. The property has been analyzed for National Register eligibility, and would not likely meet the significance Criteria A, or B for connection with events or persons, nor would it meet Criteria C for architecture. The likelihood that it would yield significant archeological associations has not been determined, thus the likelihood that it would meet the requirements of Criterion D for listing in the National Register cannot be established at this time.

Description Summary

The John M. Bush property is located on a sliver of land between MD 30 on the west and the Western Maryland Railroad on the east. A number of large industrial complexes are located immediately across MD 30 from the property. It may date from the period just after Bush acquired the land from adjacent property owners. The current ca. one acre property retains a large dwelling and two outbuildings, located north of the rear section of the ell--a summer kitchen and a root cellar.

Description

The house and two outbuildings located at 315 Hanover Pike, south of Trenton Mill Road, are identified with the owner shown on the Hampstead map in the 1877 *Illustrated Atlas of Carroll County Maryland*--John M. Bush. The property, adjacent to MD 30 on the south side of Hampstead near the Carroll-Baltimore County line, is located on a sliver of land between MD 30 on the west and the Western Maryland Railroad on the east, halfway between Upperco and Hampstead, Maryland. Adjacent to and open to a large agricultural area to the east of the tracks that likely truncated the property in the 1870's, the structure is oriented to MD 30 although blocked from the viewshed of the road by heavy vegetation. A number of large industrial complexes are located immediately across MD 30 from the property. These may have been constructed on land subdivided from this property, as it was owned by the Realty Realization Corporation in the mid-1950's and the property was decimated at this time.

James M. Bush may have constructed the farmstead shortly after he acquired the land from the Murray, Belt and other families. Charles Murray and his descendents possessed a considerable landholding in the vicinity of the current intersection of Hanover Pike and Trenton Mill Road [see Suffness, *Helen Hoffman House*, (MIHP # CARR-288) and *Cox-Cooper-Mielke House*, (MIHIP Carr-279)]. John A. Bush, by 1917, is shown in the *Rand McNally Atlas of Carroll County* as residing on an adjacent parcel that had been severed by the construction of the Baltimore Hanover Railroad in 1876. The current ca. one acre property retains a large dwelling, oriented east-west, and two extant outbuildings that are located north of the rear section of the ell--likely a summer kitchen and a root cellar. As the property owners were not available and access to the site was limited, identification efforts have been hampered.

The dwelling is a large, ell-shaped, two and one-half story frame structure, which is clad with asbestos shingles, as are the outbuildings. It is oriented to the west along MD 30, just south of its intersection with Trenton Mills Road. The principle, side-gabled block parallels MD 30, and has a large, full-height ell which extends from the north bay of the east, or rear, elevation. A one-story, full-width, open porch, located on the west entrance elevation, shelters the principle entrance. Jig sawn brackets transition between the square posts and the cornice. There is a steeply pitched cross gable, giving further emphasis to this entrance. A pointed four-light window is located in the cross gable end above the entry.

The large, two-story high ell continues the forward plane of the north, gable end elevation of the main block. One chimney is located inside the south end wall of the main block, and another inside of the gable end, or east wall, of the ell. This ell has two secondary entrances—one is located in the second bay on the north side of the ell, sheltered by a hip-roof, one-bay porch. Another is located on the south side of the shed roofed, five-bay long extension to the south side of the ell.

The structure is supported on a rubble stone foundation, with one small section of brick foundation in the south angle of the main block and the ell. The roofing is composed of standing seam metal. The fenestration on the main block is irregular, although window size varies, with elongated four-over-four windows located on the front façade and the first level of the north side, and shorter windows in the second level on the gable ends, with two small windows located in the gable ends of the broad roof. A small, round arch window is located in the gable end of the forward facing gable.

The ell has been extended with a shed-roof one-story addition, possibly the enclosure of a porch, extending the full depth of this five-bay-long elevation on the north side. It is a few feet short of extending the plane of the south wall of the main block. The windows in the ell on the north and south sides are uniformly a six-over-six configuration. On the rear, or east elevation, there are two windows arrayed over one another in the south bay---the one at the second level is nine-over six, and the one below, with immovable sash, has sixteen lights. A small attic window near the apex of the roof is located in the north bay of this two bay wide gable end.

The few buildings remaining of what was possibly a sizeable agricultural complex are located off the northeast corner and north of the ell---likely a summer kitchen and a root cellar. Both have standing seam metal roofs, asbestos shingle cladding over German siding and rubble stone foundations. The nearly square summer kitchen, of frame construction, is oriented to the west. It is a two-story-high, side-gable structure with one chimney located inside of the south end wall. The entrance façade is dominated by a broad, full-width, hip roof one-story porch which shelters the entry located in the north bay. The window in the south bay is three-over-three, whereas the two immediately above them are six-over-three lights. There are no windows in the north or south gable ends---and the two on the east side are boarded up and have no glass. The small rectangular root cellar, with an entrance in the gable end facing south, is dominated by a substantial overhang of the roof over the centered entry.

The current dwelling is likely attributed to J. M. Bush and shown on the east side of MD 30 and just south of its intersection with Trenton Mill Road on the 1877 Lake, Griffing, and Stephenson Atlas.

Significance Summary

Significance

The James M. Bush House conforms to a standard, I-house design that is ubiquitous in Carroll County. Many dwellings in Carroll have two-story rear ells that give them an L or, occasionally, a T shape. The James M. Bush House, although constructed as part of an agricultural complex, has little integrity as an agricultural property, in small part because it was severed from the farmland by the construction of the Hanover-Baltimore Railroad (now Western Maryland Railroad) in 1879. The once substantial 124 acre property was decimated with a variety of land transactions in the 1950's, which reduced it to ca. one acre.

The dwelling is an example of a four-over-four plan with Victorian influences and embellishments. Within many rural communities, styles such as the Gothic Revival were commingled with a rural vernacular style to create a subtle or simpler version of the "high" style of architecture. Plans and designs were found in various publications such as the 1821 Domestic Encyclopedia and as residents

prospered economically or saw their families increase, they not only enlarged their existing structures but also updated them periodically in the current styles obtained from the plan books illustrates a number of features. For one, it has a Gothic Revival decorative treatment associated with the Victorian era of the late nineteenth century. Victorian dwelling with L- and T-shaped plans are usually adorned with high-pitched façade gables, long window bays, brackets, ornate porches. The John B. Bush House is a restrained example of this decorative type, with a round-headed window high in the steeply pitched cross gable, and brackets on the porch posts. This main block is deep for its height, possibly indicating a four-over-four plan, seen at a number of farmsteads throughout the Hampstead and Manchester areas. This type of plan is generally used in dwelling that are two-and-one-half stories tall with four rooms over four rooms and gable end interior chimneys. The majority of these kinds of plans possess eight rooms, and can be three, four or five bays wide, with one or a pair of front entries. They are marked by their solidity, which stems from their 3:4 width-to-depth ratio and height of their eaves approximately equaling their depths. The four-over-four plan has been described as the last distinctive house type to emerge from the cultural hearth of Southeast Pennsylvania and the Delaware Valley and northern Maryland.

In addition to analyzing the James M. Bush House within this context of architecture, it has been considered in relation to the transition from agriculture to industrialization, and increasing urbanization (Maryland Historical Trust Historic Contexts—*Agricultural/Industrial Transition, 1815-1870, and Industrial/Urban Dominance, 1870 to 1930*), which was closely tied to the continued development of an extended transportation network.

Throughout the mid-nineteenth century the infrastructure of Carroll County increased in complexity. Among the additions to the transportation network was the construction, beginning in 1852, of the Baltimore, Carroll and Frederick Railroad, later the Western Maryland Railroad (Lee 1982:48). Stages ran between Manchester and Baltimore, along Route 30 within the project area, from the 1830's until 1879.

New growth in Carroll County was encouraged by the discovery of gold in the vicinity of what are today Melrose and Ebbvale in 1860 (well north of Hampstead). Nonetheless, transportation improvements were executed throughout the county and into the Hampstead area. To assist in the search for mineral wealth, the Bachman Valley Railroad was constructed about 1871. It spawned a series of small towns in Carroll County (Schlichter 1961:231).

Between 1876 and 1879, the Baltimore and Hanover Railroad was constructed along the eastern edge of Carroll County. It included stops within and near Greenmount, Maple Grove, and Millers, eventually connecting to the north with the Bachman Valley Railroad. Soon after its completion, the
