Public/private

Milestone No. 72(75) is an original monument of 1767 at its original site, marking Mason and Dixon's 72nd horizontal mile west of the northeast corner of Maryland, the beginning of their 230.228-mile West Line, longest of their survey lines run and marked during their 1763-68 commission to define the boundary between the English provinces of Maryland and Pennsylvania. As with all original West Line monuments, this milestone was quarried and carved in England, of oolitic limestone, measuring about 12" square by about 4 1/2' long, cut to stand as a post about 5' above ground with a base left rough-cut for setting into the ground, and capped by a low pyramidal top. It is embellished with vertical fluting and horizontally-fluted margins on all four sides, with fluting extending up the top ^{which rise} planes/about 2" to a centered apex. The distinguishing decorative features are the Roman capital letters P on the north side facing Pennsylvania and M on the south side facing Maryland, each V-sunk into a plain shallow circle panel near the top. In 1902, during the course of the 1900-03 Resurvey of the Maryland-Pennsylvania boundary, this milestone was reset presumably to stand about 1 1/2' above ground, and now stands only about 10" high, though still measures the full 12" square. It is in good condition, unaltered, quite firmly set (though jarred by recent bangs by farm machinery), with only minor chips (mostly from farm machinery), and will be endangered until better marked and protected. On the federal and state levels, No. 72(75) is significant primarily as one of the series of 135 original monuments still marking the West Line, ^{later known as the Mason-Dixon Line,} famous for its historical impact and innovative survey methods. Locally, as one of 18 original monuments marking the present Carroll/York-Adams county boundary (3 crownstones; 15 milestones), it is also significant as one of a diminishing number of objects and structures with a visually identifiable relationship to the colonial and Civil War heritage of these counties.

Milestone No. 72(75) marks Mason and Dixon's 72nd horizontal mile west of the northeast corner of Maryland, the beginning of their 230.228-mile West Line. It is an original milestone of 1767, firmly set at its original site where it was reset in 1902 during the course of the 1900-03 Resurvey of the Maryland-Pennsylvania boundary. It is in good condition, unaltered.

The area here is quite level, open farmland, sparsely settled. The site is within Election District 1 of Carroll County, MD; Germany Township of Adams County, PA; about 3/4 miles due east of Harney, MD; about 1 1/2 miles west southwest of the scattered settlement of Kingsdale, PA; about 3200' south of Conover Road (LR-01014), off the end of a long private lane to the Milburn brick house, in a fenced farm field about 60' from the corner of an east-west/north-south fencing marked by a large deciduous tree. It cannot be seen from any road or easily from closeby, any season, and is endangered by farm machinery because it is unmarked and so low in the ground.

As with all original West Line monuments, this milestone was quarried and carved in England, of oolitic limestone, measured about 12" square by about 4 1/2' long, cut to stand as a post about 3' above ground with a rough-cut base for setting into the ground, and with a low pyramidal top. It is embellished with vertical fluting and horizontally-fluted margins on all four sides, with fluted planes rising about 2" to a centered apex. The ^{decorative} distinguishing/features are the Roman capital letters P on the north side facing Pennsylvania and M on the south side facing Maryland, each V-sunk into a plain shallow circle panel near the top. In 1902, No. 72(75) was reset presumably to stand about 1 1/2' above ground, and now stands only about 10" high, though still measures a full 12" square. It is quite firmly set though ^{recently} nicked and slightly loosened by farm machinery banging into it; is in good condition, with only minor nicks and chips (especially on the south side and into the letter M), and ^{all surfaces are} noticeably weathered.

Milestone No. 72(75) is significant on the national and state levels primarily as one of a series of 135 original Mason and Dixon monuments still defining their 230.228-mile West Line, the boundary later known as the Mason-Dixon Line, famous for its historical impact and precise, innovative survey methods. The site was preliminarily surveyed in 1765 and monument set in 1767, where it remains ^{in good condition}unaltered to this day, although reset more securely in 1902 during the course of the 1900-03 Resurvey of the Maryland-Pennsylvania boundary. Locally, as one of 18 original monuments marking the present Carroll/York-Adams county boundary (3 crownstones; 15 milestones), No. 72(75) is also significant as one of a diminishing number of objects and structures with a visually identifiable relationship to the colonial and Civil War heritage of these counties.




