CARR-320 Crumbacker/ Curry House

The next two houses present another set of attached houses. Abraham Crumbacker bought a half-acre lot from John Kurtz and David Stem in 1809 for \$35. Before his death in 1817, Crumbacker had constructed a double house on the site comprising 3467 and 3465 Uniontown Road. Both houses contain some unusual features for Uniontown. The most obvious is the fact that the bay containing the side entrance is offset from the other symmetrically arranged two bays. **3467 Uniontown Road** has another interesting feature: the chimney is located at the same end as the side entrance. The exterior details, including the uneven width siding, six-over-six sash, and window frame ornamentation with cornices on the first story, are from the period of the construction of the house. Jacob Glazier, a cabinetmaker, bought the property from Crumbacker's estate and subsequently sold each house to different owners. In 1852, George W. Kuhn of Baltimore City bought 3467 Uniontown Road, and he built the two-bay addition on the west side of the house before selling it in the same year.
