The David Roop House was built by David Roop, the owner of Roop's Mill, and was built for his own residence. It is a substantial brick structure built in a T-shaped plan. The main facade shows the longevity of Federal-style characteristics in this region with its five-bay, symmetrical facade, common bond with flat-arch lintels, and brick dentil cornice in two rows. Double-tiered porches are located on each side of the wing. There is a marble datestone in the south gable end.


