The Elmer Fritz Farm complex was destroyed by its owner at some point c. 1996-1997. No above ground structures survive and the site area has been extensively disturbed by demolition and earth moving activities. We agree with SHA's determination that the Fritz Farm property, including its architectural and archeological components, is no longer eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places, due to loss of integrity and *total destruction of the resources.*

900 Littlestown Pike is a mid-nineteenth century farmhouse that has some elaborate ornamentation from a Victorian period remodeling. The original house is a representative regional farmhouse with an L-shaped plan. The ornamentation included a three-sided tower with peaked roof, a large gabled dormer, and a one-story porch that was the full length of the main (east) and north facades. The farm complex also includes some significant features such as the Victorian style cupolas on the bank barn and the tile silo.

SUMMARY: The C. Elmer Fritz Farmstead is a late 19th century farmhouse and farm complex that retains many of its outbuildings. The farmhouse contains a log ell that may be the original farmhouse to the complex. This log section was converted to an ell when the main block, with its Victorian style ornamentation, was constructed about the turn-of-the-century. The fanciful Victorian trim includes patterned shingles in the gables, a gabled dormer with shingles on the main facade, and a five-sided bay window with an octagonal roof and an elaborate decorative metal ornament at the peak. The domestic buildings on the south side of the house consist of a frame washhouse and an ornamental concrete block smokehouse. The remains of a stone springhouse stand east of the farmhouse. The farm complex on the west side of the farmhouse includes a frame bank barn, tile silo, frame stable, wagon shed, chicken house, and hog pen.

DESCRIPTION: The C. Elmer Fritz Farmstead (900 Littlestown Pike) is located on the west side of Littlestown Pike. The farm complex is located at the end of a .4 mile dirt lane that intersects Littlestown Pike approximately .2 mile south of Old Bachman's Valley Road. The site is gently sloping topography and a springhead that feeds a stream leading into Meadow Branch is located slightly east of the farmhouse.

The farmhouse was apparently built in two sections with the current ell being the original house. This is a two story, three bay by one bay structure with a stone foundation constructed of log covered in weatherboard. The south elevation has a double-tiered porch that has been partially enclosed. The west gable end has been covered in shingles and has two-over-two sash window on the first and second stories and a smaller three-over-three sash window in the gable. The north facade is three bays wide with a one-story, full-length porch that continues along the later addition. This facade has an entrance in the northernmost bay of the first story and two-over-two sash windows in the other bays of the first and second stories. The structure has a gable roof covered with standing seam sheet metal and a centrally located brick chimney.

The main block of the house is a two and one-half story, three bay by two bay structure with a stone foundation. It was built of frame construction and is currently covered in aluminum siding. This section has a gable roof covered in standing seam sheet metal. An ornamental brick chimney rises

SUMMARY: The history of the C. Elmer Fritz Farm is difficult to determine because data in the land records and secondary sources do not provide a clear picture of the development of this complex. The property was owned prior to 1838 by John Formwalt, a tavern-owner who may have had a tavern on this or an adjoining property. From 1838 to 1883 the property was owned by the Byers family. Later owners were George C. Crass, Edgar G. Hull, Frank H. Garner, G. Walter Fritz, and C. Elmer Fritz. An increase in value of \$2600 between 1906 and 1911 indicates that some of the Victorian style improvements may have occurred during that period when it was owned by Frank H. Garner.

HISTORY: The history of the C. Elmer Fritz Farm is difficult to determine because data in the land records and secondary sources do not provide a clear picture of the development of this complex. The property was owned prior to 1838 by John Formwalt, who is listed in the 1837 Carroll County tax assessment as a tavern-owner. It is unlikely that the current structure was a tavern, but there was a log structure on Littlestown Pike (CARR-675; that was torn down in 1977) adjoining the Fritz Farm that could have been the Formwalt tavern.

On April 3, 1838, John Formwalt sold the Fritz Farm to Michael Byers (Carroll County Land Records Liber W. W. 2, Folio 147). It was a 100 acre parcel of "The Resurvey on Young's Purchase" and the purchase price of \$4000 recorded in the deeds indicates the probability that there were improvements on the property at that time. The 1862 Martenet's Map of Carroll County shows a farmhouse of Michael Byers at this location, and it is shown as the David H. Byers residence in the 1877 Illustrated Atlas of Carroll County. The property remained in the Byers family until 1883.

from the south gable end, but the chimney in the north gable end has been rebuilt.

The asymmetrical main facade faces east and has a centrally located entrance with a one-over-one sash window above it on the second story. The northernmost bays have a five-sided bay window (the three outermost bays have one-over-one sash windows) with an octagonal roof and an elaborate decorative metal ornament at the peak. The southernmost bays of the main facade have a one-over-one sash window on the first story and a double window on the second story. On the roof above the double window is a gabled dormer with a double window, alternating butt-end shingles in the gable and a pattern of pointed-end shingles on the sides.

There is a full-length, one story porch on the main facade with square posts, small brackets with quatrefoils, and the remains of a stick-style railing. The porch wraps around the northeast corner of the main block and continues along the full length of the north elevation.

The north and south gable ends have one-over-one sash windows in each of the bays on the first and second stories. A highlight of the Victorian style ornamentation are the gables which contain patterned wood shingles around the two tall and narrow one-over-one sash windows. Above the windows, a projecting gable on serpentine brackets has alternating butt-end shingles. The gable area around the windows is ornamented with alternating patterns of straight-end and pointed-end shingles.

The domestic buildings on the south side of the house consist of a frame washhouse and an ornamental concrete block smokehouse. The one-story, two bay by one bay washhouse is rectangular in plan and has a projecting roof to cover the porch on the east (main) facade. The east elevation has a door and a six-over-six sash window. The gable roof and projection are covered in standing seam sheet metal. The washhouse is covered in an imitation brick asphalt siding. The south elevation has an exterior end brick chimney with a four-pane window in the gable. The north elevation has a six-over-six window on the first story and a double four-pane window in the gable. The ornamental concrete block smokehouse has a square plan on a concrete foundation. Its pyramid-shaped roof is covered in sheet metal. It has one batten door on its south elevation.

The remains of a stone springhouse stand east of the farmhouse at the springhead for a stream that runs into Meadow Branch. The roof and wood framing of the springhouse is entirely gone, so that all that remains of the rectangular-plan structure is the exterior stone walls. The west elevation contained the batten door and a square louvered window. The east elevation contained one square window. The north and south gable ends were unfenestrated.

The agricultural buildings stand in a complex to the north of the main house. There is a frame bank barn which has been extensively added to during the 20th century with an extension and enclosure of the projecting forebay and additions on each gable end of the barn. The barn has a gable roof with three square gabled cupolas. On the bank side of the barn is a tile silo.

To the southeast of the bank barn is a small stable of frame and vertical board construction. The stable has a rectangular plan, gable roof, and small shed roofed addition on the east elevation which served as a hog pen. West of the barn was a large wagon shed of frame construction. The gable roof of the wagon shed projects out on the east and west elevations to extend the structure for extra machinery bays. North of the wagon shed is a hog pen and chicken coop. Also, southwest of the wagon shed is a long chicken house of frame construction.
