

## NATHAN GORSUCH HOUSE

112 EAST MAIN STREET

Probably built around 1864 by one Nathan Gorsuch, no. 112 East Main Street stands out in the City, although it has certain features which keep it in the mainstream of the City's domestic buildings. These standard features - 2 sections, 3 bays - are nicely balanced with certain avant-garde features - the glowing yellow color, the wrap around classic porch, and the flat roofed rear section (rather than the gabled rear section). A slightly more frivolous connection exists between this building and others in the City - the doorbell, enframed by French Curves, is an exact copy of that found on the Fletcher House, no. 254 East Main Street.

## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The two-sectioned "Nathan Gorsuch" house rests elegantly on its half of lot 20 in New London (now Westminster) fronting the south side of East Main Street (Md. Route 32) about 60' from that street's intersection with Lincoln Road.

Painted a pleasant canary yellow, the house rises three full stories above its coursed fieldstone foundation. Nine bays, regularly spaced three on each floor, pierce the Flemish Bond north (entrance) facade. The entrance door, a 2-panel half-glass mid-Victorian door, is the eastern ground floor bay, with two double-hung sash windows to its west. The windows have six-over-six panes and are bordered by white wooden sills and three course gauged flat arches. Second and third floor windows are similarly treated, but are smaller (ground floor windows are slightly elongated) and have yellow wooden sills that match the wall color. All this rests below a crisp two part denticulated entablature which finishes the deep green tin gable roof.

A Doric-columned 10' wide flat roofed porch shelters the ground floor on the north and east sides of the buildings Main Street section. The east side of that section is topped by a continuation of the entablature which finishes the gable end of the roof. There is one single pane attic window within the gable; it is a broad architrave trimmed pedimented window. The rest of the wall is blind.

The flat roofed southern wing has, by virtue of its nine 8/8 windows, a glassed-in second story, which, to the south, hangs 10' over the ground floor. Otherwise on the ground floor, the wing has 9 pairs of 2/2 windows to the south, and three pairs of six-light basement windows north of the central six-panel door. The south facade of the wing was probably originally a two-tiered porch; all that remains is the western half of the second floor. The rest of the second floor is filled in, but has a pair of 4/4 windows. A board and batten wall covers the ground floor, but is pierced by an eight-light casement window. All that is exposed of the Main Street's south facade is the third floor which has three 6/6 windows, treated the same as those on the north. The entablature is retained over only the eastern window.

**STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

Proudly standing above its neighbors, and glowing in its color, no. 112 East Main is a yellow highlight on East Main Street. Although it has certain features which keep it in the mainstream of the City's domestic buildings, it is unquestionably unique. These "standard" designs - 2 sections, 3 bays - are nicely balanced with certain avant-garde features - the color, the wrap around classic porch, the flat roofed section (rather than the gabled rear section). A less integral connection exists - the doorbell, enframed by French Curves, is an exact copy of that found on the Fletcher House, no. 254 East Main Street.

Therefore, it is fitting that the first recorded owner of the lot was John Fisher, who also owned the "Fletcher House". Fisher leased the lot to Nathan Gorsuch on February 23, 1849 (Carroll County Deed Book 14, Page 297). The lease was for half the lot, 30' x 198' and ran for 92 years with annual rent of \$9.50 due each April 1. It seems likely that the house hadn't yet been built, as it was possible to redeem the rent for \$158, which is what Gorsuch did through Fisher's executors on March 21, 1864 (30/513). Presumably Gorsuch built the house before this redemption, as he sold the place to William Stansbury on the same day for \$1400 (34/92). Stansbury sold to Charles Billingslea three years later for \$1700 (34/213), who retained title, through various straw deeds (35/101, 35/259) until he sold to Abraham Huber for \$2500 on April 1, 1863 (35/315). Huber in his Last Will and Testament, left the house to Margaret Davis (Will 12/148, dated January 3, 1917), whose will (14/384) conveyed the place to Elizabeth Roberts Davis. Ms. Davis; will (19/11) appointed Ernest E. Wooden as executor; in this capacity he sold the place to the present owner, Mildred L. Heutzman, on June 27, 1967 (423/110).
