

47-47½ LIBERTY STREET

Regardless of whether the brick section, the three story demi-mansard roofed brick section, was built before or after the two story rear gabled roof section or not, 47-47½ Liberty Street is of interest today primarily for the way the front section works with the neighbor, number 49 Liberty Street. Although it could be argued that the rear clapboard section is older, possibly dating from the early 1870's, the semi French front section creates, with number 49, a splendid ten bay wide three story tall front on the east side of Liberty Street (State Rt. 27) in Westminster. The two buildings create a very urban feeling, in their height and sense of density. Its possible that when they were built there was a feeling that this section of town, expanding due to the closeness of the railroad tracks and the downtown business area, would be densely built up. It was not, but these two buildings are evidence of that eagerly anticipated growth.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The three story tall five bay wide thin building numbered 47-47½ Liberty Street fronts the east side of that street (State Rt. 27) nearly opposite that street's intersection with Chase Street in Westminster. The original section of the building is a very thin brick structure between full mansard (at least on the front) roof and high coursed fieldstone foundation.

A central axis dominates the principal facade. The axis is created by a three sided oriel window on the second floor, with the entrance door directly below and a double pediment capped dormer window above. The oriel window has four double hung sash windows on it: one each on the sides and two to the street. The windows are narrow and have stained glass on their upper sashes, with single panes of clear glass below. The base of the oriel is wood and panelled; the cornice continues the heavy molded cornice that tops the second story of the principal facade. A c. 1950 louvered glass storm door marks the entrance door. The door is placed between sidelights and below a narrow rectangular transom. The double dormer window has both its two lights resembling those in the oriel window; a modified sunburst decorates the pediment. Each side of the axis is identical; the ground floor has two elongated 2/2 windows with shorter versions on the second floor. All windows have black louvered shutters and white wooden sills, and those on the ground floor have three course gauged flat arches. Above the already mentioned cornice the slate roof has centrally placed (that is centrally placed on either side of the central dormer window) single dormer windows that are smaller versions of the axis-producing one. A simple crown molding tops this "mansard roof".

The sides of the building reveal that the "mansard roof" exists only on the street side. The side facades display the roof's single pitch, and are brick all the way to the roof. The north side has an entrance door on the ground story, consisting of a glass paned door which rests below a small gable roofed porch. Directly above is one on the principal facade. A corbel capped chimney, placed a few inches inside the exterior wall, tops this facade. The south front of the main structure is blind except for a third story storm window placed towards the front of the building directly opposite that on the third story of the north facade. A two story gable roofed clapboard addition goes off to the east of the original section, and runs across the older building's entire width. (This is making the assumption that the brick building is original and the clapboard section is an addition. This is not a certainty).

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

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Edward Lynch, sold the land, part of the track called "Resurvey of Hollow Rock," to Adam Reigle for \$100 on July 25, 1863 (Carroll County Deed Book 30, Page 263). The deed in describing the lot, notes that it is on the south "of the new street called Liberty Street". It is possible that the clapboard section was then built, as a structure is indicated on this site on the 1876 plat of the City. The City Directory lists one M. Babylon as living at 47 Liberty Street. On January 13, 1886 Reigle sold the place, whatever existed, back to Edward Lynch for \$1300 (64/85), and it stayed in the Lynch family until Michael John Lynch sold it to John H. Smelser on August 10, 1918 (see deeds 85/564, 132/31, 132/32, and 132/475). Smelser sold the place to John H. T. Earhart on March 26, 1919, (133/521), and it has been in and out of the Earhart family every since. The present owner, Lyman A. Earhart, took title on October 9, 1970.
