Summary paragraph:

This two-and-a-half story, wood sided house has undergone exterior renovations which have hidden the original fabric. The complex consists of several late eighteenth/early nineteenth century outbuildings with intact original fabric.

Description

House (1795-1800/1820-1840)

The 2 story, log main block is three bays by two bays with an asphalt shingle gable roof parallel to the road. The steep pitch roof's eaves and returns are bordered in decorative woodwork. The principal facade is the east elevation which has been enclosed with a wood and glass porch. The current owners have built an open porch on the north elevation and use this as the main entry. Fenestration on the main block consists of six-over-six windows except on the upper story of the east and west elevations which have three-over-three windows. A shed roof wraps around the north and east elevations over the open and enclosed porch areas. Log walls and wide board planking is visible in the easternmost room on the first floor.

A 2-1/2 story ell addition has been built on the south elevation and is two bays by two bays with an asphalt shingle gable room. The addition forms and extended "I" with the main block and is covered in the same wood siding. Fenestration consists of four-over-four windows and the wood and glass enclosed porch extends across the addition's east elevation.

Barn (1800-1820)

The 2-1/2 story frame barn with fieldstone foundation is a classic example of the Sweitzer barn. Built into a slight bank which forms the ramp area, the barn has an unsupported forebay, metal gable roof, perpendicular to the road, and wood ventilators on all elevations. The structure is four bays by three bays with a stall/stable area located in the lower level of the forebay. The visible forebay joists are whole logs extending from the fieldstone foundation. The foldyard is oriented towards the east

Outbuildings (1795-1800/1810-1820)

The 1-1/2 story frame on fieldstone foundation summer house is located to the east of the addition with a metal gable roof parallel to the main house. Originally log, the summer house is clapboard sided; missing pieces of siding reveal the extant log underneath. The three bay by two bay structure has six-over-six windows on the first level and single 6 lite windows on the gable ends of the loft area. There are arched surrounds on the first level windows and several bubble glass panes. A fireplace is

located on the west side of the interior but the original brick chimney has been removed.

A fieldstone spring house is located northeast of the summer kitchen. A deep entry and window opening with wood grate are located on the west elevation. A clapboard addition has been constructed on its south elevation and a flat metal roof extends across the spring house and addition. A frame shed with one six-over-six window is situated to the north of the main house and used for storage.

To the south of the main house are a frame chicken house and a storage barn/corn crib [with shed addition] both with the identical decorative woodwork along the eaves. A frame outhouse sits between the two outbuildings.

8. Significance

Summary paragraph:

The Boring House is a significant example of a late eighteenth/early nineteenth century farm complex which has retained the majority of its outbuildings with original fabric extant. Aside from the log construction, the Boring House Complex is one of the few remaining complexes of its type within the project area. The house is a rural vernacular style architecture with a Four-over-Four plan addition on its south elevation. Renovations to the structures have hidden rather than obliterated original fabric. The extant outbuildings serve as a representative example of a nineteenth century farm.

History:

The Boring House Complex is located on a farm lane south of Manchester Road and west of Maryland Route 30 and Manchester. The property is most likely part of one of the many Boring family patents of 1790-1795.

Evaluation:

Constructed circa 1795-1800 with a subsequent addition circa 1810-1820, the Boring House property is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. The property is not eligible under Criterion A; no significant events historically or agriculturally have been determined to be associated with the property. The property is not eligible under Criterion B; no persons significant in local, state or national history have been determined to be associated with the property. The property is eligible under Criterion C; the house, barn and outbuildings are significant examples of a late eighteenth/early nineteenth century farmstead. All structures have maintained their original form and function as well as their original fabric. The farm though smaller in acreage is still used agriculturally thereby maintaining its original nineteenth century use.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This complex of farm buildings is set back from the south side of Maryland Route 27, and is approached by a long dirt driveway. The buildings are surrounded by many trees and shrubs.

The farm house is two stories high, three bays wide, with its principal facade facing east. It is gable roofed, with a gable end facade. Sawn woodwork decorates the eaves of the roof on all sides and suggests a cornice return on the principal facade. A one-story porch extends along the east facade and wraps around the south side of the house. The porch is open on the east, supported by four chamfered posts; on the south, it is enclosed and entered by doors on both the east and the south. The house may possibly be of log construction, and is now sheathed with white asbestos siding. The east facade has a doorway and two windows on the first story, with three windows on the second floor. All are 6/6, as are most windows on the house. On the north and south walls, the second story windows are smaller in size, except on the west, where there is a full two-story section which is one bay wide.

The complex has several outbuildings of interest. To the north is a two story frame barn on a stone foundation with an second story overhang on the east. This barn features the same decorative woodwork seen on the eaves of the house. To the west of the house are several small outbuildings, including a corn-crib with the same decorative woodwork. To the south of the house is a one-story, shed-roofed stone springhouse.

The property is probably that shown on both an 1862 Martenet Atlas of Carroll County and an 1877 Lake Griffing and Stevenson atlas of the county as owned by Jac. (probably Jacob) W. Boring, who also owned another house to the east of this property.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The farm is significant as a good example of a mid-19th century Carroll County farm complex which still preserves its original character. Its farm house is a good example of a house form seen in the Manchester area, and its collection of outbuildings are of particular interest, especially the unusual stone springhouse. The house is of interest for its probable log construction and early date.
