NOTABLE FEATURES, HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE AND DESCRIPTION OPEN TO PUBLIC <u>no</u></p> <p>The brick house located north of Maryland Route 282, about a mile west of Cecilton, dates from the early nineteenth century. It is a three bay, two story, "A" roof house, with attic, and is one room deep. It also has a 1 & 1/2 story wing to the east which was built at the same time as the main part. The brick is laid in Flemish bond on the south facade, and the other sides are laid in common bond. It has neither water-table nor belt course, but there is a brick cornice. The dormer has 3 over 6 sash. The door is simple 6-panel, with transom.
