DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Craig-Dean House c. 1820-1830 is a two story three bay by one room hall/parlor fieldstone house just south of Liberty Grove on Liberty Grove Road. The house faces east with the main gable running north/south.

The house is built into the east slope of a hill so the east busement walls are fully exposed which includes the kitchen ell walls. The kitchen superstructure is frame with novelty siding and medium sloped slate roof like the main block.

The west (main) facade is presently three bays. Across but there were four openings on the first floor originally with two central front doors. A 6/6 sash window flank the single central door opening. The stonework approaches the original but earlier seams and two stone lintels provide evidence for the earlier appearance. Three 6/6 sash light the second floor and a boxed cornice stretches across above. The end eaves to the roof were extended probably when the slate was added.

The gable end windows are basically plain stone walls with four pane attic lights. The surrounds have a slight bead as did the other window surrounds which have been replaced. Interior end chimney stacks rise out of each end and are laid with brick above the roofline.

The kitchen wing was probably added in the mid to late 19th century. A side entrance on the south wall has a single gable roofed porch with turned support posts. The windows have single pane sash. A brick stove stack rises out of the gable end.

The interior of the stone section has been gutted on the first floor and the stone walls have been filled out with studing. Raised panel hearth wall and recessed cupboards have been built in.

The second floor has also been altered significantly but the enclosed winder stair with beaded board door remains intact to the attic.

The attic framing is a common rafter system with a mortised peak joint with wooden pins. Double struck cut mails were used in the attic.

The basement has a cooking fireplace with carge timber lintel. The flooring was taken out of the attic. There are wide floor boards with pairs of plugged holes spaced down the board. Two windows and a center door provided light and access to the backyard but the rear kitchen addition covers these openings.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Craig-Dean House is significant for two reasons. The first is its use of wide board flooring with the paired holes which was probably lumber shipped down the Susquehanna River and cut in the local saw mills. Secondly, the hall/parlor house used to have two front doors which is a less common house type.

David Graig owned this house along with a number of others in Liberty Grove and the immediate area. He probably used this structure as a rental or tenant property. He is listed on the atlas patron list as coming from Ireland around 1848 and owning 272 acres in 1877.


