4. NOTABLE FEATURES, HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE AND DESCRIPTION OPEN TO PUBLIC *No*

The Anchorage, located one mile north of Cecilton has at least four building stages. Presumably the first part was constructed in the late 18th century and now forms the 2 1/2 story brick center portion. It is three bays long with central door and a small wood stoop. On the "A" roof are two dormers with 3/6 sash and a very tall chimney on the north side, which is now the middle of the wing of the entire house, as there is an addition three bay long frame structure with the same dormers as the previous section. This wing also has a chimney on its north end. The latter frame wing is presumably of 19th century date.

On the south side of the house is a very large 2 1/2 story townhouse built in 1835 by Commodore Jacob Jones. It is of brick laid in Flemish bond, three bays long and two bays deep. The entrance is located on the north side of this portion and has paneled door, jab and semicircular fanlight above. All windows in this section have 6/6 sash; paneled shutters on first story. A pair of huge chimneys are on the south gable and two windows between them light the rooms within. At the very apex of the roof is a small casement which lights the supre-attic. Two large dormers with segmental arch roof and sash, and pilaster treatment pierce the "A" roof. The entire roof is covered with wood shingles.

To the west of the north wing, a garage and utility area have recently been added
