DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Benson House is a three story frame dwelling constructed around the middle of the 19th century, like several buildings in the community (e.g., Kenneth McLean House, Smithers House, Levredge-Smithers, etc.). The building is three bays wide, and like its neighbor to the north, it has a two story wing with a farther lean-to to the west. Beneath the window sills of the facade is applied composition brick, but all other parts of the wall are covered with wood-grain aluminum siding. The windows have 6/6 sash on both storys and 3/3 sash on the third story.

The house possesses one of the best entrances of the period with sidelights and transom and pilasters flanking the composition. The transom and sidelights have interlocking diamond muntins and the glass is colored. The door has handsome and unique five panels like a celtic cross.

Originally there was a small flat roof porch with balustrade, access being from the north side. this was replaced by an 'A' roof hood supported on wrought iron stanchions. Shutters have also been removed. Original barge boards possess the ovolo molding like the house adjacent the bank.

Adjoining Mrs. Benson's house and the neighbor to the south is a handsome white picket fence. A brick walk leads from the gate to the rear yard.

The brick chimney has been removed from the north gable above the roof.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Mrs. Benson's House is a good example of the typical form dwelling constructed in Chesapeake City in the mid-19th century. It retains many original details including the front door, surrounding colored sidelights and much interior work, even though parts of the original have been covered or removed.

Architecturally, it represents the home of a moderately comfortable family whose chief source of income was the Canal

John Clark, captain of a canal boat probably built this house about 1856-1857 since he leased the property in 1856 from Richard Bayard. The Clark family lived here for many years, until 1935, when the Loraine's took possession. The property has always been a dwelling and remains a leasehold property with annual rent of \$15.00.







ELKTON QUAD.




