## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Johnson house is a three bay long, three story mid-19th century dwelling with a four bay two story wing on the east. The walls are covered with grey weatherboard and the roof with green asphalt shingle. Within the eave is a gutter and beneath the eave are down spout boxes bearing an American eagle. On the north gable is a short chimney from which rises a chimney pot.

The facade originally had a porch, but only a concrete floor indicates its location and size. The entrance is located on the south side of the facade and possesses sidelights and transom. The door itself has four raised panels with reeded trim and corner blocks, a very unusual arrangement. The windows of the first story extend nearly to the floor and have 1/1 sash (originally 4/4) and paneled shutters. On the second story are 4/4 sash and louvered shutters. The third story windows have 2/2 sash and no shutters.

On the south east corner of the principal section has been added a two story bay window. Around the yard is a handsome late 19th century cast and wrought iron fence. A small pod was built on the south side of the porch around the turn of the century. Its walls are covered with german siding. The building is very well maintained.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This residence is almost identical to the Bennett-Reed House and the McDonough-Barwick House in the same block of Bohemia Ave. It is representative of the second phase of building in Chesapeake City, and it retains many original features including a cast iron fence along the street. Its form and height are similar to each of the first four dwellings along Bohemia Avenue south of Third Street.

Joseph W. Lindsey, owner and operator of a sawmill and lumber yard on the causeway, built this house about 1872. In the early days of the Canal, lumber was the most important commodity being shipped through the Canal. Logs came down a series of canals along the Susquehanna River from central Pennsylvania to saw mills and lumber yards close to the centers of population. The logs were transported generally in rafts fastened together with other logs and chains. A large pond on the south side of Back Creek served as a holding area until the mill could saw them into lumber. The boards and beams that the sawmill turned out were stored in covered sheds to cure or were shipped to lumber yards in the Baltimore area or north to Wilmington and Philadelphia by barge or sailboat. This was serving one of the prime purposes of the original founders of the C. & D. Canal - that of facilitating shipment of products from central Pennsylvania to the markets on the Delaware Bay and Chesapeake Bay.

Because of Mr. Lindsey's contribution to Chesapeake City commerce, this house has significance.






