DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The only house facing Fourth Street is a small two story frame structure two bays wide and two deep with a three bay long two story wing to the south. The main portion of the building has a door on the east bay and window with 2/2 sash and louvered shutters on the west bay. Its walls are covered with molded German siding similar to the siding of Dr. & Mrs. Davis' house. On the second story the windows have 1/1 sash and louvered shutters (installed up side down), painted grey. The 'A' roof is covered with aluminum colored raised seam tin. Behind the center of the building is a small chimney which serves the wing as well.

Although the back wing is three bays long, it appears to have been lengthened, as there is a seam in the cornice. The walls of this section have plain weatherboard siding.

On the east side of the wing there appears to have been a narrow porch which was enclosed and later widened and screened.

Originally, in place of the brick stoop with iron balustrade, there was a one story porch on the facade. The door originally had a fully paneled door.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Although this house has been moved, it is important to Bohemia Avenue due to the fact that it is a two bay wide dwelling covered with molded German siding found on only four of Chesapeake City's buildings. As the only dwelling facing Fourth Street, it relates the transition from the larger dwellings of Bohemia Avenue to the simpler forms on George Street.

This house started life on George Street and was moved to this location about 1900 by Zachariah Cooling, a ship captain. At one time there was a greenhouse on the property used for raising cut flowers. John C. Lupfer, an undertaker, had his work rooms and parlor here until, 1931.

Zachariah Cooling, grandfather of Walter F. Cooling, who owns much property in Chesapeake City in 1976, was a grain boat captain. Several grain boats were owned by Joseph Steele, whose home was on the south west corner of George and Third Streets and whose wharf was along Back Creek near the Hotel. The grain boats took on grain here and took it to Baltimore where it was transferred to sea-going vessels for foreign shipment. Some of the grain was taken to flour mills in Baltimore, Wilmington, and Philadelphia. Farmers brought the grain to the wharf in farm wagons where it was transferred to a granary, or loaded directly on the grain boat. Mr. Cooling was a prominent citizen in the town and the property has significance for that reason.






