 DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The house closest the corner of Charles and Second Streets on the west side of Charles Street is a duplex. It is constructed on brick piers and has a brick chimney with terrecotta chimney pot. The sides of the four bay long, two bay deep building are covered with white molded german siding, the same type used on the Davis House and the only dwelling facing Fourth Street. Like the duplex on Third Street at the corner of Pine, it has an 'A' roof over the front half of the building and a leanto over the two story rear portion. The entrances to the two units are located on the outer bays. The two windows between and four windows above have 6/6 sash and formerly had shutters. A secondary entrance is located on the north side of the rear. It has a small leanto porch.

The building is neatly painted but the steps are in poor condition. An unpainted picket fence extends from the division of the two dwellings northward.

Installation of shutters and possibly a hood above the entrance would enhance the appearance of the building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Like the duplexes on Third Street, this house is representative of a form of dwelling built for families who worked on the C. & D. Canal. Its siding is unusual and similar to its neighbor as well as the Vaughn-Lupfer House and the Davis House.

Early in the 1870's, Harvey Burgett established a sawmill on the south side of Back Creek and at the west end of Second Street. The mill was a big one with drying sheds, offices, and the milling sheds covering about four acres of ground. This house was apparently built on part of the "Mill Lot", and may have been occupied by either the mill owner himself or by one of his employees.

Chesapeake City before 1850 was surrounded by forests and mills such as this one whittled away at the hardwood tree stands. Much timber was floated down the series of Susquehanna canals from central Pennsylvania but local woodsmen, anxious to take advantage of the cash market for timber, cut trees locally and hauled them to local mills. Farmers often cut timber from their own woods, had it sawed into beams and boards and built farm buildings themselves.

Burgett's mill was a busy place until it was destroyed by fire around 1890. Harvey Burgett died in 1893 and his estate was eventually divided. This house was sold and has been home for Canal men and their families ever since. It is now a rental property.







 Sanborn Map 1933, Sheet 4


