CE-896, CE-897, CE-898, CE-899

A small grouping of late 19th Century residential structures stand near the northern most Maryland crossing of the Octoraro Creek at New Bridge. The small community developed under the influence of the once active Sun Paper Mill along the east side of the Octoraro. A sturdy iron Pratt through-truss span (CE-896) replaced its predecessor in the late 19th Century under the direction Charles H. Latrobe. The commission and construction of the bridge were completed during the term of County Commissioners, William Potter, Wilson Pierson, and Elis Sentman. Local oral tradition links the crossings name of "New Bridge" with the completion of the new span. The J. S. Ray store and residence (CE-897) is a typical two story three bay frame house with a commercial bay attached to the west gable end. Other structures in the immediate area are modest two story two or three bay frame houses. (CE-898, 899)

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The J. S. Ray Store c. 1860-1877 was a partial store and residence. The mercantile use of the building has been lost but the structure does remain. The 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ story frame building faces south with the primary gable running east/west.

The main block is 5 bays across by one room deep. A single story shed roof porch extends across the main facade and is closed-in on the eastern end. The house rests on an uncoursed stone foundation and is sheathed with composition tile shingles over weatherboards. The roof is of medium slope with a composition tile sheathing.

The main facade is a series of doors and single panel sash windows with plain trim. The windows on the second floor are 6/6/ sash. The two doors are located in the second and fourth bays from the eastern end.

There is a boxed cornice across the front of the house.

The gable ends have a couple 6/6 sash and attic lights. Stuccoed stove flues rise out of each gable end.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to a local resident the store operated until the early 20th century by Herb Reynolds. The area was supposedly a popular and secluded place for boot-leg whiskey and it was known to have been hidden in the store. The building itself is a typical mid to late 19th century house type. The modification of the form for a business was a common practice and not unusual, especially in a rural area such as New Bridge. It still retains its basic 19th century form and a few details.


